

CLAIMS U. S. GRAIN FUTURES ACT IS AGAINST THE LAW

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—(By the Associated Press).—"The grain futures act re-enacts verbatim regulatory provisions of the former law, which was found unconstitutional," Henry S. Robbins, counsel for the Chicago board of trade, declared in his argument before the United States supreme court today on appeal in which the constitutionality of the present law was attacked.

"The law violates the constitution because in it congress attempts to regulate commerce wholly intra-state in character; it interferes with the legislative discretion of the states respecting their intra-state commerce and is in violation of the tenth amendment to the constitution," he said.

Further, its unconstitutionality was claimed, in that section six of the law attempts to create a crime and to confer on a commission composed of officials appointed by the present judicial power to try and to punish violation of the law.

Under the new law, grain exchanges are compelled to admit to membership representatives of the farmers' co-operative associations and to permit them to rebate commissions back to their members. This Mr. Robbins contended, violated the constitution in that it deprived the exchange as well as its individual members of their property without due process of law.

Counsel contended that the removal of an obstruction to interstate commerce, as proposed by the law, is a "mere pretext under which congress seeks to regulate what is exclusively intra-state commerce."

Recitals in section three concerning alleged market manipulation were denied. No corners have occurred in fifteen years, Mr. Robbins declared.

In the record submitted were affidavits of twenty-two professors of political economy in leading universities showing the benefits of the futures trading and the present marketing system.

SUGGEST PLAN OF PAY AS YOU GO IN SCHOOL FINANCING

CLEVELAND, Feb. 27.—(By Associated Press). School financing and nomination of candidates for the presidency for the department of superintendence, National Education association, occupied the attention of delegates to the annual convention today.

The educators have virtually decided to adopt a program for school financing to be recommended to state legislatures which calls for the discovery of new sources of revenue for school purposes and the freedom of boards of education to levy taxes for educational purposes without the interference of state or municipal governments.

To this may be added an endorsement of a "pay as you go" policy of school financing which means the raising of all revenue needed, even for new school buildings, by direct taxation and puts an end to bond issues, it became known today as the committee on resolutions met.

ON LOOKOUT FOR MORE BOOZIATORS IN SPOKANE DIST.

SPOKANE, Feb. 27.—Cecil L. Landon, 27, was arrested here today as the pilot of an airplane which landed a cargo of liquor, at a local aviation field last Sunday, and has been charged with conspiracy to violate the federal prohibition laws. The police are still looking for Jack Smith, declared to have driven the same plane on other liquor running expeditions.

Frank Kohl and Benton Werner, occupants of an automobile to which the airplane was declared to have been transferring its cargo are being held on conspiracy charges. The airplane was seized yesterday in a field on Five Mile prairie near here.

SPOKANE, Feb. 27.—The hunt for the "booziator"—Sheriff Clarence Long's title for a birdman who carries commercial cargoes of liquor in his airplane—whose deserted plane was seized yesterday by federal officers and for whom a warrant had been secured, continued today, with federal and state officers co-operating in the chase.

In the meantime officers also kept a lookout for a second airplane which Sheriff Long announced was in operation, carrying whiskey into the United States from Canada. The planes used in the traffic are fast and powerful, he claimed, and often make a trip a day.

According to Sheriff Long, the automobiles which meet the planes at designated places are equipped with large spotlights and large white sheets.

If the plane were to arrive in the day, the automobile would be driven onto the landing field and covered with the sheet to guide the approaching plane. If at night the spotlight would be turned directly upwards.

No liquor was found in the plane captured yesterday but officers claimed to have identified it as the one which Sunday delivered eight cases of liquor to an automobile at the municipal landing field here and escaped. The two men who received it were arrested on federal charges and their automobile confiscated.

FIND SKULL OF ONE OF EARTH'S FIRST MEN

NEW YORK, Feb. 27.—Anthropologists said today that the fossilized human skull, believed to be of the Tertiary period, discovery of which was announced in Associated Press dispatches from Buenos Aires last night, may be the oldest human relic ever unearthed.

If proved authentic, Dr. Franz Boas, Columbia university anthropologist and world famous scientist, asserted, it would possibly be older by 500,000 years than the skull of an erect manape known as the Pithecanthropus erectus, which was found in Java 23 years ago. It may even prove, he said, to be the skull of one of earth's first men.
