ULTIMATE TEST OF CHRISTIANITY SPIRIT OF CHRIST

In a sermon which went to the very core of Christianity last night, Dr. Wm. H. Huff, brought his audience face to face with "The Ultimate Test of Christian Experience." His text was, "If any man have not the Spirit of Christ he is none of His." The evangelist's interpretation showed rare insight, and his incisive statements cut away relatively unimportant conventionalities and made all see "the one thing needful."

He said in part: "In this text Paul lays down a great principle which is the ultimate test of all religion. He seeks the heart throbs of Christianity, and finds it, not in petty and man-made rules, neither in creedal statements nor dogmas; nor yet in ecclesiastical authority; no, not even in the words of Christ.

"His test is supremely simple, yet tremendous in its application. Let us see:

"If any preacher have not the Spirit of Christ, he is none of His.

"If any church member have not the Spirit of Christ he is none of His.

"If any church have not the Spirit of Christ, it is not of His.

"If any nation have not the Spirit of Christ, it is none of His.

"No, Paul did not find the meaningful thing of Christianity in organization or subscription to dogma."

In conclusion the minister defined and illustrated the spirit of Christ, showing it to be one of sympathy for, and service to, needy humanity.

Dr. Huff is to address the young people this evening, though he announced that the service will be of interest to all. He spoke to the high school students this afternoon on "The Three Greatest Things in History."

SUMMER TOURIST HOTEL IN ASHLAND AGAIN AGITATED

ASHLAND, Feb. 28.—Another phase of the hotel situation is looming on the horizon, the proposition embracing a plan to erect a chain of these establishments between Portland and San Francisco, 100 or more miles apart. These would cater to the public in general, but more particularly to motor tourists. Instead of buildings on a colossal scale, the structures would be modest as to size and design, but a number of cottages and garages would be included in each community unit of the scheme, thus affording ample accommodations under a system which might appeal to many in preference to the individual big hotel feature. Ashland would be a logical spot for such an installation, and beginning with Portland, places in rotation have been named throughout the state, including Eugene, Roseburg and this city, as eligible sites in Oregon, with Dunsmuir, Red Bluff, and Sacramento across the California border, the system to reach the end of its rope with San Francisco as the southern terminal. Aside from individual motorists, these tourist centers would be linked up by a series of auto stages running on schedule. Effective March 1, stages will leave Ashland daily at 8 a. m. for Grants Pass and Roseburg, with through service to Portland and way points daily; also at 1 and 5 p. m. for Grants Pass only. Southbound, leave Roseburg daily at 4:20 p. m. Fares, Ashland to Roseburg \$4.60, and to Portland, \$8.20. Of course Medford is also included in this direct line of auto stage travel. One can imagine the convenience and comforts afforded by a series of well-appointed hotels at these leading centers, all under a specific and well-defined management, while the cottage system would appeal to many who prefer to tour the country more leisurely, and for the purpose of which stopovers on a liberal basis

will be allowed. A San Francisco syndicate is back of this project and already investigating its feasibility.
