That metrical jest is a favorite with

But though most victims of the tender
passion only vaguely believe in a pre-
vious existence in which they were
lovers, Mrs. Edith Rockefeller McCor-
mick has discovered not only the pre-
cise time and the precise place, but
the particular man to whom she was
wedded thousands and thousands of
years ago.

She recalls with startling definite-
ness that when a girl of 16 she be-
came the wife of King Tutankhamen,
whose mummified remains are even
now being dug up from a tomb in the
sands in the region of Luxor. She
says she was his first wife, and, in
showing no disposition to hasten to
the side of her long lost husband, it
may be that she has never forgiven
him for marrying again. It is a long
time to cherish a resentment, but time
is a different thing to people that can
think back for thousands of years.

According to Mrs. McCormick, her
married life with Pharaoh Tutankha-
men was very brief, lasting only two
years, but it was long enough to im-
press upon her mind a distinct mem-
ory of the furniture in the king's
chamber and in particular the chair in
which he compelled her to sit when
talking with him on the subject of
abandoning her father's religion and
reverting to the more popular faith.
She is also emphatic on the point that
the lock of hair found in the king's
tomb was not hers, but her succes-
sor's.

As yet Mrs. McCormick has not ex-
plained which of the two pictures of
the daughters of her father drawn by
Faucher-Gaudin from a photograph by
Petrie is that of herself. Unless she
remembers sitting for those portraits
done by an Egyptian artist who may
have difficulty in deciding which is
which, for they look very much alike
and neither is what might be termed a

VILLA DETHRONED

NEW YORK, Mar. 2.—Frankie
Genaro, the east side pugilist who
won the world's amateur champion-
ship in his class in the last Olympics,
today is the new American flyweight
champion, ruler of the 112-pounders.
The deposed monarch is Panchito
Villa.

There are a good many of the 15,000
who saw the crown change hands last
night in Madison Square Garden, who
think the clever Filipino was treated
harshly and at least should have re-
ceived a draw.

It is the second questionable deci-
sion here in seven days, many object-
ing to the award last week of the
light-heavyweight title to Gene Tun-
ney of New York who defeated Harry
Greb of Pittsburgh.

LOS ANGELES, Mar. 2.—Johnny
Meyers of Chicago, claimant to the
world's middleweight wrestling cham-
pionship, who defeated Kalla Pasha,
Turkish heavyweight who is now a
motion picture actor, here last night,
has been signed to meet Jack Ross,
middleweight of Los Angeles, here
next Wednesday night.

Sam Langford, negro, formerly
heavyweight boxer, now a wrestler,
will meet Mike Romeo of Butte, Mont.,
in a preliminary bout.

Walter Miller, Los Angeles middle-
weight, has been trying to arrange a
return match with Meyers, to whom
he lost here last year, but he insists
that Meyers weigh in at 158 pounds
ringside. Meyers says he is willing
to make 158 pounds at 4:30 the after-
noon of the contest.

Basanta Singh, Hindu, at the Los An-
geles athletic club last night.

edly be on hand.

Roseburg's stellar five, which so
nearly defeated Medford at Roseburg
and which showed much speed and
skill arrived this afternoon on train
No. 53 at 3:40 and with every mem-
ber in the host of fans is expected
to put up a whirlwind battle tonight.

Roseburg fans believe that their
team can defeat the locals as they
downed the Eugene high school sev-
eral night ago by a safe score. It is
declared by the Roseburg fans that
the Eugene aggregation is as good as
the Medford five if not better.

The new bleachers which have
been installed are expected to be
crowded and all reserved seats out-
side of the new section had been
sold Wednesday at 9 a. m. In ad-
dition to the multitude of local fans
that will be on hand a hundred
Roseburg rooters, most of whom
marched down, are expected to be spec-
tators at the important contest.

The local team is in excellent con-
dition and spirit and Coach Eddie
Durho is optimistic as usual over the
outcome of the game although he
states that it is a toss up who will
win. His optimism is, however, based
on a naturally optimistic spirit.

Although the starting line-up is
as yet undetermined it is expected
that Beeny and Singler will start at
forward positions, Baughman at cen-
ter and Williams and Chastain at
guards.
