FEDERAL RESERVE BOARD SCEPTICAL OF FARM L.N. BILL

WASHINGTON, March 2.—Shore to obtain cheaper credit for the farmers than has been failed to produce any appreciable effect in the interest rates charged by banks "in the small cities and towns of agricultural sections of the west and south," according to observations of the federal reserve board in its annual report, made public recently.

The board says after a survey that the interest rates of those financial institutions remain practically unchanged, despite the lowering of reserve rates by the reserve banks in the past year and other moves designed to be of assistance to the agricultural industry.

It is apparent that in those sections of the country where relatively high interest rates prevail and there is a wide margin between such rates and the federal reserve bank rates, the latter have but slight, if any effect, upon rates charged by reserve bank members, the report says.

In the financial centers there is a closer relationship between reserve bank discount rates and rates charged customers by reserve member banks.

In December 1921, member banks charged their customers rates of five per cent or less on eight-tenths of one per cent of the paper rediscounted with the federal reserve banks, whereas, in December, 1922, this percentage had increased to 41. It is also interesting to note in this connection that while 55 per cent of the paper redis-

counted by banks in small cities and towns in December, 1922, bore rates of six per cent or less, over 57 per cent of the paper rediscounted by the banks in large cities bore such rates.

"As a matter of fact, banks in small cities and towns charged 5 per cent or more as 75 per cent of the paper rediscounted with the federal reserve banks during December, 1922."

While it desires to be of aid to the farmer and has gone as far as present statutes appear to allow in that direction, some critics, the board says, claim the broadened ruling of reserve regulations to be contrary to sound reserve banking principles.

Extension of rediscount privileges to farm paper of nine months maturity, as proposed in the pending farm credits legislation, will fail of the mark sought, in the opinion of the board. None of the unsecured paper can be used as collateral for issues of federal reserve notes until such paper comes within six months of its maturity, the board says and as a result it does not believe the legislation would add greatly to the average maturities of paper held by the reserve banks or fully accomplish the end sought.

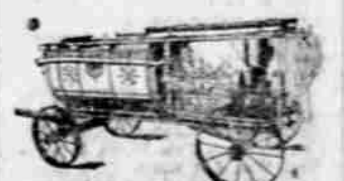

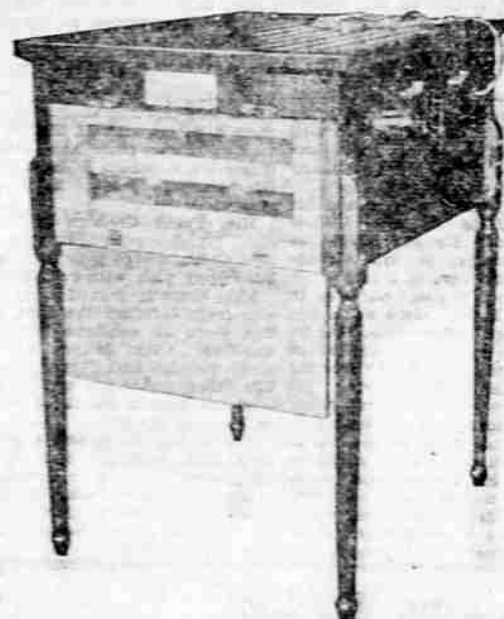
