PLANS PERFECTED FOR CHAMBER OF COMMERCE DRIVE

The framework of the organization for the Chamber of Commerce membership campaign was outlined at a meeting of the team captains held yesterday noon in the Medford hotel. Paul B. McKee, manager of the membership campaign, presided.

A two-fold organization was provided for the pre-campaign committee to make all preparations for the three days drive which would then resolve itself into groups for the actual solicitation work on March 21 and 22. The chairman of the pre-campaign committee are to act as an executive committee for the whole campaign.

The secondary purpose of the meeting yesterday was to inform the workers of the affairs of the chamber. Mayor E. C. Gaddis spoke on the past accomplishments and the future possibilities of the Chamber pointing out that prior to its reorganization three years ago it was not a big factor in the community. Evidence of the excellent work of the present chamber, he said, was the fact that 1600 personal inquiries were answered every year for the past three years.

Robert Ruhl suggested that the outstanding difference between the old Commercial Club and the Chamber of Commerce was that there was less hot air and more cold cash in the latter. H. O. Frobach outlined the financial condition of the chamber.

A general discussion followed in which a committee to investigate and answer complaints, a movement to collect delinquent dues before the opening of the membership drive, a community question box, and the preparation of a sales manual for the use of workers were suggested.

It was decided that future meetings of the team captains would be held at 7:30 in the evening at the Chamber of Commerce building.

HATCH 3000 CHICKS AT POULTRY FARM

This is hatching time in the valley which, because of the mild climate is fast becoming one of the poultry raising centers of the Pacific coast, and chickens are being hatched by the thousands at the various poultry farms and by the various home raisers.

On March 1, at the Rogue River Poultry farm on the Jacksonville road, 3000 chicks saw the light of day in a single immense hatch. According to C. F. Carpenter, the manager of this poultry farm, four hatches of between 2000 and 4000 each will be taken off this spring. The ranch now operates 14 standard electric incubators with success and plans have been made to install mammoth incubators of the most modern type to take care of the 1923 day old chicken business.

CHARLESTON, W. Va., March 3.—Eloyd Lipscombe, once given up as dead, rescued early today from the Weyanoke mine and life, all but extinguished by suffocating gases in which he lay for fifteen hours, was fanned back to a flame so strong that physicians attending the injured man said he was sure to recover. The rescue of Lipscombe reduced the death toll of yesterday's dust explosion to ten, all of whose bodies were recovered.
