FEBRUARY WAS MONTH OF MILD, DRY WEATHER

The official weather report for February shows that that month was what is known in high school and other educational circles as a cracker-jack or jimmidy, and that this year the weather for the first time in years past has returned to the normal February. It was somewhat of a tropical month, carelessly speaking, with much sunshine and little rain in comparison with past years.

Fourteen days were clear, ten were cloudy and four partly cloudy, and there was only .38 of an inch of precipitation, including one-half inch of snow which lay on the ground about the 15th. This rainfall mostly came on the 12th. There were 28 days of frost and in February there was a fall of hail.

The record of temperatures shows the following: Mean maximum, 53.19; mean minimum, 26.59; mean, 39.89; maximum, 72 on Feb. 28; minimum, 16.2 on Feb. 9; greatest daily range, 44.

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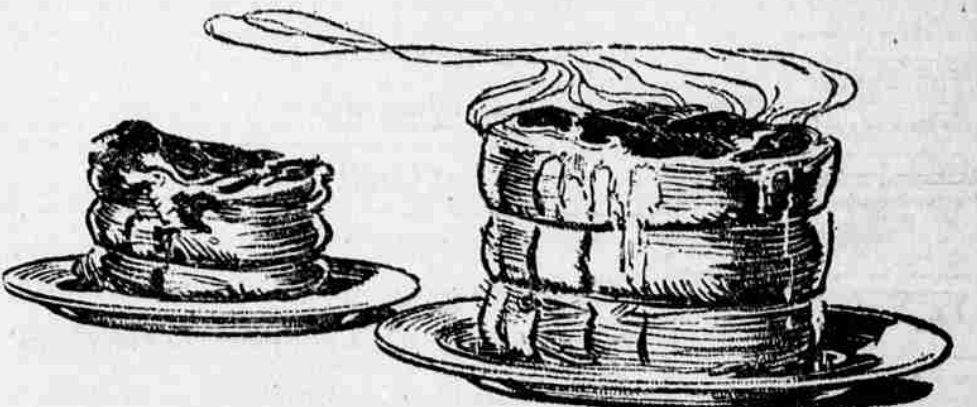
