

NOW CALIFORNIA CONSIDERS TRUCK TRAFFIC PROBLEM

SACRAMENTO. — The California legislature will be called upon to consider a bill for licensing and better regulating automobile stage and truck lines, when it resumes work after the constitutional recess. The bill, which was offered by Duval of Ventura county, would make common carriers of all automobile and stage or truck lines operating for hire over specified routes between fixed termini.

A license of ten dollars for each vehicle so operated would have to be paid within twenty days after the act became effective. This, however, would be only a preliminary. Thereafter the operators would be required to pay monthly one cent per ton mile for each vehicle with pneumatic tires, and one and a half cents per ton mile for each vehicle with solid tires. Rules for arriving at the ton mile totals are provided.

The companies operating vehicles would be required to report the number of ton miles for each month to the railroad commission, which in turn would certify them to the state board of equalization. That body would assess the amount due as taxes against the operating concern, and collect it as taxes are always collected, except that monthly settlements would be required. If any company fails to pay the sums certified against it, it would not only be subject to the laws of distraint for delinquent taxes, but the railroad commission would revoke its license to operate.

Bonds would be required from the transportation companies, and they would have to procure permits for operation from the railroad commission, just as at present, before licenses for individual vehicles would be issued.

SHOTS FIRED AT MASS MEETING IN LAWRENCE

LAWRENCE, Mass., March 5.—A riot in which one man was shot, broke out at a meeting here last night to raise funds to carry on the legal fight to free Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti, convicted at Bridgman for first degree murder on July 14, 1921 for the killing of a paymaster and a guard in South Boston in April, 1920. A number of shots were fired and many of the 200 persons present were engaged in a free for all fight.

The adjournment of congress found the presidential desk practically clear. On the household in Florida waters, the president's party will be guests of Mr. and Mrs. Edward H. McLean of Washington.

Last Day of Congress

WASHINGTON, Mar. 5.—The country today faced the now-unaccustomed prospect of nine months without a session of congress. The 67th congress had passed into history and incidentally with its four sessions, set a new record in the extent of time actually spent in the legislative halls. The exodus of members and former members of the senate and house who tolled through the sessions was in full swing today.

Since the adjournment came yesterday at noon in the senate and that of the house six minutes later after a brief final session conspicuously lacking in thrills of pre-adjournment hours of some other congresses.

The closing in the house had the usual colorful qualities of song and sentimental formalities, with a section of the marine band on hand to fill out the program. Songs of an impromptu quartet of members warmed the whole house and most of the spectators in the crowded galleries to a lusty swelling of the chorus.

On the business side of the program while President Harding signed a total of 99 bills, including the farm credits bill, during the closing hours, 55 of these receiving the signature after his arrival at the capitol, about half an hour before adjournment, little was accomplished by either senate or house on the last day. After hearing "swan song" speeches by Senators Frelinghuysen, republican, New Jersey, and Sutherland, republican, west Virginia, and a tribute to Senator Williams, democrat, Mississippi, by his colleague, Senator Harrison, Mississippi, the senate tried vainly to pass a few minor bills. It ran into a fifteen minute filibuster by Senator Dial, democrat, South Carolina, which was terminated by the adjournment gavel.

Included in the committee reports submitted just before the close of congress was that of the senate committee, headed by Senator LaFollette, republican, Wisconsin, on its investigation of the oil industry. A number of other inquiries will be prosecuted during the recess, the senate alone having ordered investigation into the administration of the veterans' bureau affairs, the gold and silver industry, naval oil land leases, reforestation, reorganization of government departments, the Great Lakes Gulf Waterway project and readjustment of senate employees' salaries.

Measures of importance which failed of passage during the closing days of the congress included:

The administration shipping bill which was filibustered to death in the senate.

The resolution of Senator Smith, democrat, South Carolina to appropriate \$10,000,000 for the purchase of nitrates of calcium arsenate to aid southern cotton producers.

The constitutional amendment proposal of Senator Norris, republican, Nebraska, to advance the convening

dates of congress and presidential inaugurations.

Another constitutional amendment proposed by Senator Wadsworth, republican, New York, for popular referendums of future constitutional changes.

The resolution of Senator Brookhart republican, Iowa, proposing investigation of the sugar situation.

Dirt Farmer Confirmed

WASHINGTON, Mar. 5.—President Harding today gave recess appointments to Elmer S. Landes of Ohio, republican, and Morton L. Corey of Nebraska, democrat, as members of the farm loan board.

It was made known also that Mr. Harding had decided not to withhold longer the commission of Milo D. Campbell of Michigan as the "dirt" farmer of the reserve board. Although confirmed several weeks ago the president had refrained from signing his commission pending a senate decision on the McNary nomination.

TOLD HOW HALE WAS TAKEN

call him into court, and the sick man then expressed a determination to appear.

The efforts of the court to have the two sides reach an agreement on the taking of Hale's testimony were unsuccessful.

The jury was excluded from most of the morning session.

Assistant Attorney General Liljeqvist in his opening statement to the jury for the prosecution, said the state expected to show:

That Dr. Jovett P. Bray was present at the "hanging," by the positive identification of Hale, who saw his face, illuminated by a flashlight as he (Bray) bent over him; that chiropractic treatment was administered to Hale, after he had swooned, from the ordeal alleged to have been inflicted upon him by the masked and robed men, and that Hale recognized the southern drawl of Defendant Bray and his general shape and actions.

That the state expected to show that J. P. Hittson was present, from Hale's identification of his figure and voice, the fact that he will testify members of the party called him "Chief," and partially from an automobile.

Alibi Manufactured.

The connection of Howard A. Hill, the third of the defendants, with the hanging episode, the state said it expected to prove by his own admission in a lodge room, at which he was alleged to have declared "he knew who hung Hale," that he himself had burned the rope, and that alibi for those present had been prepared a week in advance, and that the names of those furnishing the alibi were given. The state said it would call witnesses to prove these allegations, and that it would be shown the hanging and alibi were worked out with detail.

The state attorney declared it would probe the source of the robes and masks used in the affair, and their disposition afterwards.

By incidents occurring at the "hanging," the state held it would link at least three "John Does" who by actions and statements before, during and afterwards were involved.

In a plain and unimpassioned address the assistant attorney general outlined the state's case, and reviewed the incidents of the night of March 17th last, from the time Hale was lured from his home by a phone call, until he was returned to his

home in this city. He read the indictment, charging the three defendants and 16 John Does with riot, assault and extortion.

Defense Presents Case.

Attorney Walter Winslow made the opening argument for the defense and said the defense expected to show:

By numerous witnesses that the defendants were not present at the scene of the hanging, and constituting complete alibi.

That they would attack the credibility of Hale by "as many witnesses as they would be allowed to call."

That it would be proven that Hale's record for veracity was bad, and that he had told different stories of the affair.

And that an effort would be made to impeach Hale's testimony.

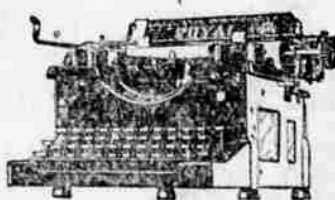
