Bids were opened recently in the office of timber sales of the United States forest service for the disposition of timber on Anna creek, north of Klamath Falls in the Crater National forest. The tract carries 10 million feet, mostly western yellow pine. The successful bidder was the Anna Creek Lumber company of Klamath Falls. The timber was sold at \$3.75 per thousand feet for yellow pine and sugar pine and at \$1 per thousand for other species. The timber probably will be milled at Fort Klamath, at Anna Creek Lumber company's plant.

KLAMATH FALLS FIGHTS HARD, BUT ARE OUTCLASSED

The Klamath Falls basketball team, challengers for the southern Oregon title were beaten decisively last night by the Medford five by the score of 75 to 22. Allen, who played center for Medford three-fourths of the game, was high point man, with six field goals and two fouls converted out of four shots. Singler was second with six field baskets while Beene and Chastain made five each. Williams, Riddle and Baughman made four each and Baughman shot one foul. Knips and Reichstein made one basket each.

The explanation is that Medford's teamwork and speed completely dazed the visitors who were unable to shoot baskets, pass, cooperate, or do anything else that is necessary, with the exception of fight. Fight they did from start to finish.

At the end of the first half Medford staged a little passing exhibition on the west end of the floor under the Medford basket and poured in scores after scores.

Moore, visiting center, was high point man for Klamath, with four field goals and six fouls. He did not miss one foul during the evening. Grove, Klamath forward, was the only other visitor to score. He tied with Moore on field baskets, making four each.

In the first half the visitors made only one field goal and four fouls. At the start of the second half a complete second team was run in by Coach Durno of Medford and they were allowed to play for ten minutes, during which time they scored 21 points.

The first lineup was then run in and played the last ten minutes during which time they scored 17 points. In the first 20 minutes the first string men caged 37 points.
