THE PRESIDENT is said to have decided not to call a special
session of congress even though the administration shipping bill

TRAVELS 1086 MILES TO MEDFORD AT COST OF 75 CENTS REPAIRS

A. J. Theis, driving a Star touring
car arrived in Medford Monday fore-
noon from the south accompanied by
three other people. Mr. Theis is an
enthusiastic Star driver, having driven
his car 6000 miles with a total repair
cost of seventy-five cents for a new
fan belt.

The present trip which he is taking
has already taken him over a course
of 1086 miles. The car is loaded with
four adult persons and three hundred
pounds of baggage, one hundred and
fifty pounds of which is hung in the
rear of the spare tire. The other
hundred and fifty is carried in the
tonneau. With this load the little car
averaged 23.4 miles to the gallon of
gas for the entire 1086 miles.

Although his home is at 247 N. Los
Angeles St., Anaheim, Calif., this
particular trip started from San Diego.
Mr. Theis intends to tour Oregon and
Washington stopping in Portland and

Seattle as well as in the smaller
towns. He states that but one adjust-
ment has been made on his car since
he bought it in November, 1922, that
being a tightening of the silent chain
which drives the timing gears and
that it has cost him a total of 75 cents
for a fan belt which he bought before
he started on the present trip.

Driving over mountain grades from
San Diego with three hundred pounds
of baggage and four adult persons the
car has climbed all hills in high gear
and has averaged 23.4 miles to a gal-
lon of gas. "I don't believe," said Mr.
Theis this morning, "that there is any
four cylinder car on the market that
will outlast this car on the grades."

Mr. Theis is a disinterested owner
and is not connected with the Star
Motor company. He is, however, a
thorough booster for the Star. When
the party stopped at the Mason Motor
company headquarters here yester-
day a picture of the car with its neat-
ly packed load was taken in front of
the Star and Durant sales headquar-
ters at 30 North Holly street.

The Mason Motor company opened
for business here on Feb. 17th and
to March 3rd, a period of 14 days, sold
32 Star and Durant cars; a total of
\$29,375 worth. At the present time
they have only one used car on hand.

according to officials of the firm, for
eight new cars.

IT'S TOO MILD AT CRATER LAKE NOW FOR ICE FREEZING

Pete Ord, the forest ranger of Crater
National park who is in the city on
a brief vacation from the lake
where the snow is 10 feet and three
inches deep at the rim, brings back
the news that the experiment this
winter at the lodge by the Crater
Lake company, which holds the park
concession, of manufacturing its own
ice at the lodge in winter has not been
a success so far and probably will not
be, because the temperature has been
too mild at the lake.

The coldest temperature at the lake
so far this winter was four degrees
above, notwithstanding the popular
impression that that high elevation is
a very cold place in winter. Anna
Spring camp, five miles lower down in
the park from the lake always has a
colder temperature by several degrees.
When it was 19 degrees below zero at
Fort Klamath, 20 miles distant, this
winter's cold snap it was only four
degrees above at the lake.

Last fall the Crater Lake company
planned to freeze its own ice by nat-
ural means for summer consumption at
the lodge and have Jack Hemstreet,
its caretaker at the lodge in the win-
ter take care of this work of freezing
water there and storing the ice re-
sulting therefrom in the lodge ice
house, assisted by Peter Ord, the park
forest ranger. The plan was to fill
large tin cans with water at night and
next day empty the frozen contents
of the cans and store it.

However, the plan has not worked
with much success because of the
comparative mildness of the tempera-
ture this winter, and so far it is said
that only about 400 or 500 pounds of
ice has been so manufactured and
stored.

During February alone there were
18 clear days in succession at the
lake. While the present depth of the
snow at the rim is 10 feet and three
inches, two feet more than last year
at this time, a few weeks ago the
snow depth there was 12½ feet.

day.

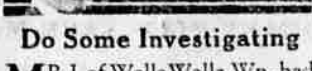

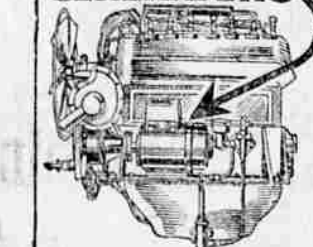
