Special News of Interest to Farmers in Jackson County

The Business Man and the Farmer

Of recent years our country, as a whole, has come to realize that unless the farming class is prosperous, there can be no prosperity for any other class. Never before has the farmer and his interests received so much attention as at the present time.

The press of the nation is giving a large amount of space to the discussion of the problems that confront the American farmer and because of this, the reading public is beginning to realize that agriculture is indeed the foundation and mainstay of our nation and that every person, no matter what his occupation or position may be, is vitally concerned as to whether our farmers as a class are prosperous.

Secretary of Agriculture Wallace recently said: "The next fifty years will decide whether the American farmer shall become an independent producer, or whether he shall become like the agricultural class of Europe, a mere peasant, living on a low scale and deriving the barest existence from the soil."

It is not a pleasing picture for any of us, especially farmers, to contemplate.

As one of the foremost counties in the state, the Jackson county business men are thoroughly awake to the fact that by taking hold with the farmer and working shoulder to shoulder with him, in helping to better farming conditions in the county, by helping the farmer to become more prosperous, that he is helping himself fully as much as he is helping the farmer. There is a sentiment abroad in the country today that when any interest stands in the way of our agricultural interests, be it a banker, a merchant, or manufacturer, or even the farmer himself, that it is the work of the country as a whole to remove that obstruction, and to untiedly get behind the farmer who is the foundation of all prosperity here in the valley.

There never was a brighter outlook here for general farming, than there is at the present time. With the coming of irrigation the matter of an unhampered production is assured.

With a county united in sentiment, with farmer and business man working together this valley will come into its own.

When we can point out to the prospective settler hundreds of prosperous farmers; when we can show him bright, attractive farm homes; when he sees well dressed, contented farmers, and farmers' wives and children, then he will make up his mind that this is the place for him.

Jackson county could use no better advertising than to display to the tourist as they pass through, farm after farm carrying all over it signs of prosperity.

Facts About State Farm Bureau

A little over two years ago, with Jackson county taking a leading part, the State Farm Bureau was organized with Geo. Mansfield president.

Before the state organization was entirely perfected it became evident that there was a real need for an organization of wool growers for the purpose of handling their wool.

President Mansfield at once called a meeting of the sheepmen in Albany and while the attendance was not large, the interest was good, and those present took hold of the proposition in earnest, and a start was made that is proving a splendid success. The story of their operations will be taken up in an article by itself.

The grain growers, too, felt the need of better marketing facilities, and again the Farm Bureau got behind the movement and as a result the grain growers formed a grain pool, through which, in a very short time, marketing conditions were greatly improved. While it has not been all clear sailing for either the wool or the grain growers yet they have made steady advances and the farmers of Oregon are many thousands of dollars richer because of the two activities alone, which the State Farm Bureau has been the means of setting into action. Because of the fact that Jackson county was the leading factor in the formation of the State Bureau, and because the county furnished President Mansfield, who has enthusiastically and untiringly worked for the success of the movement, we feel that we can point with a certain amount of justifiable pride to the achievement of the grain and wool growers.

Outside of these two achievements the state bureau has carried on many lines of work all looking toward bettering Oregon agriculture. At the present time, while there are difficulties to be overcome, the outlook for the future of the State Federation is one of increased usefulness.

As Jackson county was a pioneer in the state-wide movement, so should the county, now that we have successfully made the first pull, get squarely behind the State Federation and with a strong, wide-awake membership at home play well the part of taking a leading place in a State Farm Bureau that shall be a large factor in the future prosperity of Oregon agriculture.

ROGUE RIVER VALLEY GREATEST BOSC PEAR DISTRICT IN WORLD

The Rogue River valley produced, last year, two hundred cars of Bosc pears, more Bosc pears than were produced in the rest of the United States. Already the Rogue River valley is "the greatest Bosc pear district in the world."

There is a reason, this is the only place where the "Rogue River Bosc" can be produced. The "Rogue River Bosc" is an altogether different pear from the thick skinned, mottled Bosc raised to some small extent in the eastern states. Soil, climate, altitude and its sheltered location all combine to make the Rogue River valley the home of the Bosc. Here it is neither too cold in the winter nor too hot in the summer. No wind. Plenty of sunshine in the spring. No long cloudy spells. Water for irrigation. Enough cool nights to develop a slow growing

hardy tree that is much more blight resistant than trees raised in the warmer California section. The Rogue River Bosc has a quality not equaled elsewhere. "Only one place where the Rogue River Bosc can be raised—the Rogue River valley."

Wherever in the Rogue River valley these little "concentrators" are to work they are making money for the owners. They are the real "Gold Diggers" of Jackson county; pay dirt everywhere, and the deeper they dig the greater the profits. There is not a single Bosc tree in bearing in the valley that is not making profits for the owner. "Plant a Bosc tree, set a Gold Digger to work, no more worry about your water tax."

Quantity production of Rogue River Bosc must now be attempted if the Rogue River valley is to keep its place in this "golden" sunshine. Five thousand cars of Bartlett's were shipped east from California last year. The Bosc is a better eating and a better keeping pear. The east has had a taste. They can use as many Bosc as Bartlett. They want two thousand cars now and in a few years will be using five thousand cars. The business and professional men, the orchard men and farmers of the Rogue River valley must put the Rogue River Bosc over now and put it over big or some other district with less natural advantages, but having more enterprise, will beat us to it. "If you want to raise Bosc pears come to the place where they are raised—the Rogue River valley."

The Rogue River Bosc should become a community proposition. With the business and professional men, as well as the farmers and orchard men, back of it and into it. The best business experience in the valley is now needed to get this underway in the big way necessary to insure success. An f.o.b. market must be secured for every box of Bosc pears raised in the valley. Again quantity production becomes necessary. A pre-cooling and packing plant should be owned and operated by the Bosc growers, and every Bosc pear raised, pre-cooled and packed at this packing plant. A standardized and dependable pack can, in this way, be secured, and a dependable pack of Rogue River Bosc with proper advertising would mean a ready sale f.o.b. for every box raised. Afterwards our other late pears could be sold under the same label through the same channels. We must put this over so big and in such a thoroughly business-like manner that if any one, any place, any time wants Bosc pears he will think of the Rogue River valley and know he will get the best to be had when he orders Rogue River Bosc from the Rogue River growers.

"Order your Bosc pears from the Rogue River Bosc growers." Pre-cooled and packed by the growers. Dependable. Always the same.

How can it be done? We must have a Bosc drive and keep driving. Every farmer possible should be induced to set out some Bosc trees. Every orchard man that possibly can should increase his acreage, either by grafting or setting out young trees. Every business and professional man should back some one up to some extent in raising a Bosc pear orchard. The shortest cut is to graft other varieties to Bosc, especially D'Anjou and Comice. Either of these varieties in most soils here are shy bearers. If one-half the limbs are cut out and grafted to Bosc the half left will produce, in many instances, more pears than the whole tree did before. So by grafting half the limbs to Bosc a Bosc tree can be raised without reducing production. By grafting a Bosc tree can be developed four or five years sooner than by setting out young trees. Hope, something to look forward to is a great asset. If every farmer had a few hundred Bosc started he would see a way to pay his assessments for irrigation when they begin to fall due. Even a young Bosc orchard producing two boxes to the tree will pay the total cost of irrigation in one year. Now with many the only thought is to sell out and get out. An exchange of ownership. What is needed is additional owners secured by subdivisions where the present owner will only sell a part of his land and stay on a part himself. We must "sell" the valley again to the present land owners by "selling" the Bosc pear idea to him. "Struck the Pay Streak" in the Rogue River valley. Doing it with Bosc pears.

Organize a Bosc Pear club. Boost Bosc pears in the clubs already organized. Re-establish the old time fighting morale. Declare ourselves. Have a circular printed giving a brief history of these "Gold Diggers" of Jackson county. No one can read the simple facts without being convinced that we have surely "struck the pay streak." Put up signs along the Pacific and Crater Lake highways: "This way to the Rogue River valley, the greatest Bosc pear district in the world."
