**MAY DISCARD
INFLAMMABLE
MOVIE FILMS**

CHICAGO, Feb.—(By the Associated Press)—Radical innovations in movie theatre construction will be possible if congress passes a bill, now before congress, to bar the interstate transportation of inflammable picture films, according to engineers of the Underwriters Laboratories here, who have just completed a study of the subject and issued a statement on their findings.

Moving picture theatre architecture, they say, has been developed around the necessity of having an elaborately fire proofed projection chamber, carefully isolated from all fire exits, and equipped with special devices to confine the flames in event the highly inflammable nitrocellulose films catch fire.

Passage of the pending bill, which is sponsored by the association of state fire marshals, would outlaw the inflammable film in favor of a slow burning film which is no more dangerous than a role of ticker tape or any other paper commodity.

In tests made at the laboratories it was found that strips of nitrocellulose film would burst into intense flame when a lighted match was applied, burning to ashes in a few seconds. A match applied to the safe film would light it, but when the match was removed the flame would die out of its own accord. The nitrocellulose film is so inflammable that it is subject to spontaneous combustion at a temperature of about 300 degrees, while when once lighted it will continue to burn even though immersed in water.

"The economic future of the movie business, I think," said A. H. Small, vice-president of the laboratories who is in charge of the film investigation, "lies not in the 'professional' producing and exhibiting class, but in the development of small portable movie cameras so that every man can take his own pictures and have his own film library at home to project for his friends."

Development of the small, cheap camera, within the reach of every pocketbook, made photographic film production possible on a quantity basis that brought sufficient returns to warrant laboratory research and development for the perfection of the industry. In the same way the home movie camera offers the big field for future development. But a safe film is necessary first.

**H. S. FRATERNITIES
ARE CONDEMNED BY
HIGH S. PRINCIPAL**

CLEVELAND.—Fraternal and sororities have no place in the high school program, according to the view advanced today by Principal H. E. Winner of the South Hills high school of Pittsburgh, Pa., to the department of superintendence of the National Education association. He said:

"The fundamental work of the high schools is to develop centers for training in leadership and service, not only for the future but for the immediate present. It is only as young people live within school that they are able thus to live well without school. All types of activity which make for training in leadership and service are justifiable within the school. More and more regular opportunity must be offered pupils for participation in the work of the school. It is only thus that right habits of work may be formed."

"Extra-curricular activities should come as a felt need within the school rather than a definite program being presented simply for the purpose of organization. No activity should be countenanced in high school that does not have the approval of the administration head of the school and to whose meetings a delegated faculty member, one in sympathy with the activities shall not be present. This means that fraternities and sororities have no place in a secondary school program."

**FRANK DOREMUS RUNS

DETROIT, Mich., Mar. 7.—Nomination of two candidates for mayor, one of whom will be elected in April to fill the unexpired term of James Couzens, now United States senator, held chief interest for Detroit voters today in the city primary. There were six candidates for the mayoralty nomination including James A. Inches, police commissioner under Mr. Couzens, Arthur E. Wood, state senator and Frank E. Doremus, former congressman.

The voters also had before them a proposal to raise the salary of the mayor from \$8000 to \$12,000 a year.

**CALIF. GOVERNOR
ALLOTTED \$91,600
FOR HIS EXPENSE**

SACRAMENTO, Calif.—It costs the state of California \$91,600 to maintain its governor for two years, although his salary is but \$10,000 annually, or \$2,000 for the biennium.

In addition to his salary, the governor is allotted other funds provided by statute to enable him to maintain his offices and to live in a manner commensurate with the dignity of his post. These sums include the salaries of two secretaries, a stenographer and a messenger, aggregating \$12,100 annually; a fund of \$9,200 a year for postage, traveling and contingent expense; a special secret service fund of \$5000 which the governor can disburse on his own vouchers, without accounting; an allowance of \$8750 annually for the upkeep of the executive mansion; and \$750 a year for printing, such as messages, commissions, and other documents issued from the executive offices.

The governor also gets his offices in Sacramento, San Francisco and Los Angeles; the use of the executive mansion and its furnishings; an official—such as it is—and some smaller items of expense that are not charged in his section of the budget are incurred on his account. These include guards and a gardener for the executive mansion and grounds, costing \$7080 annually.

**FAMOUS SHIPYARD
TO BE USED FOR
A SUMMER HOME**

MARBLEHEAD, Mass.—The shipyard at the edge of the Marblehead cliffs where many famous yachts were built, and aircraft later were manufactured, is to be changed soon into a residential site.

In 1905 W. Sterling Burgess, a naval architect, purchased the land and erected a yacht building plant. He constructed a marine railway, and the rock was blasted to prepare a channel which would accommodate vessels with a draft of 11 feet. Another adjunct to the yard was the Ox, a 50-foot steamer designed for towing. Mr. Burgess carried both pilot's and engineer's licenses to operate the ship. Later Mrs. Burgess was granted pilot's papers, and came into prominence as the only woman pilot on the coast.

The first boat to take shape was the Pontiac, for George Silsbee. Many other yachts followed, some of which were successful in championship races in Boston, New York, New Orleans and other racing centers.

In 1907 the 110-foot gasoline passenger boat, Pineland, of 300 horsepower was built for Hayden & Co. of New Orleans. The Pineland was one of the first vessels to be propelled successfully by motor.

Airplane construction was begun in 1909 and the first completed craft was tested in February, 1910, by Mr. Burgess, A. M. Herring and Norman Prince. The flight was the first made in New England.

In the summer of the same year, Mr. Burgess opened a testing and flying station at Plum Island, near Newburyport, and the product of the Marblehead factory was taken to the station by the Ox. Claude Grahame-White, British aviator, made the first flight over the city of London in a Marblehead-built airplane. In 1911 Harry N. Atwood attained fame by his flight in a Burgess plane from Marblehead to Washington. During the fall of that year another of these planes was fitted with pontoons and pilots succeeded in making it alight and take off from the surface of the ocean, heralding the now familiar seaplane.

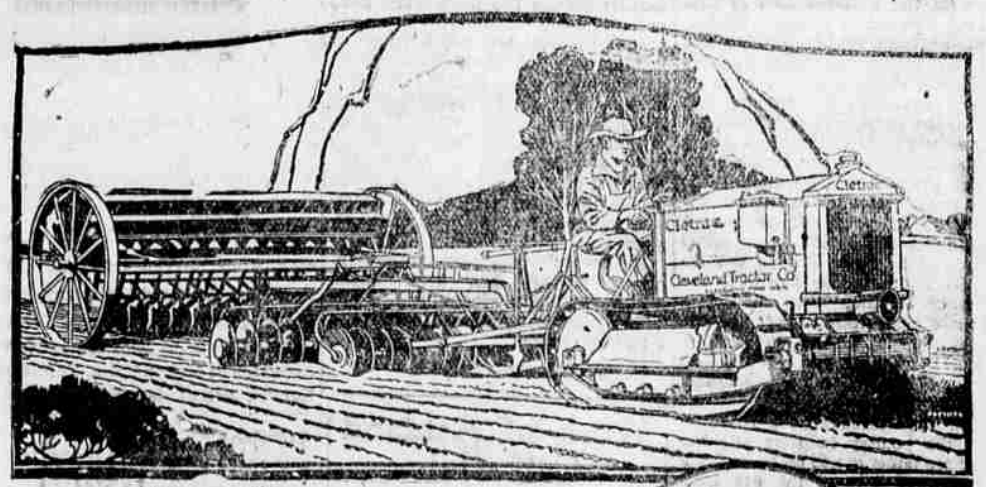
