IDAHO VANDALS WIN CONFERENCE BASKET B. TITLE

MOSCOW, Idaho, March 7.—This small university town took time to turn to earth today, following two days in the clouds, climaxed with a lousy celebration last night when the University of Idaho Vandals won the Pacific coast conference basketball championship for the second successive season, defeating the University of California Bears 29 to 25.

Last night's game was the second of a series to decide the championship, the Vandals previously having won the Northwest championship from the University of Washington in post season games. California in the meantime had won the championship of the southern half of the coast from Stanford and had sent her team north to meet the winner of the Washington-Idaho game.

Monday night the teams met and Idaho won 25 to 20. The Bears went to last night's game bent on revenge, and they got it—for one half. When the fighters stopped to rest, California was leading 15 to 11. Even in the first part of the second half the Bears were leading, taking an even point lead at their high point in the game, four minutes after the opening of the second half.

Then, with the score at 19 to 12 for California, the Vandals started on a comeback. A field basket and two foul conversions were followed by the striking of Belcher, Bear guard, on personal fouls. California got one field basket from a long shot by Zell and Captain Fox of Idaho followed it by two field baskets of his own, plus a free throw, tying the score at 21 all.

But California once more took the lead on a foul conversion, lost it on a field basket, followed by two free throws, and again evened the score with three throws from the foul line, leaving the score 25 all with four minutes to play. In those four minutes Idaho converted two more fouls and made a field basket, then passed the ball under the Bears' basket until he gun ended the battle.
