L'FOLLETTE WAR RECORD DEFENDED WISCONSIN SENATE

MADISON, Wis., Mar. 8.—(By the Associated Press.) The war record of Senator Robert M. LaFollette was vigorously defended in the Wisconsin senate today by Senator Henry A. Huber, former secretary to the senior Wisconsin senator, when his resolution condemning faculty members of the University of Wisconsin who five years ago signed a round robin denouncing the attitude of LaFollette, came before the upper house of the legislature for action.

Senator Huber first read into the record a letter from Senator LaFollette urging him to withdraw his original resolution calling for a bonfire to destroy the university document now on fire with the historical library.

"I deeply appreciate the spirit which prompted you to introduce this resolution and the desire on your part to rectify insofar as possible what has seemed to you to be an unfair and libelous attack upon me," Senator LaFollette said. "Time is the great sifter and winner of truth. The formal destruction of that document cannot change the fact of its existence."

"I stated many times from the public platform in Wisconsin during the recent campaign that I would not exchange my record on the war with any man in the United States senate. History alone can judge impartially. So far as I am personally concerned, I am well content that this document shall remain as a physical evidence of the hysteria attendant upon the war."

Senator Huber declared that "in the face of his record, Senator LaFollette has been slandered and libeled as no other man of his time; his actions have been misrepresented; the truth has been suppressed; words put into his mouth he never uttered; he has been accused of being disloyal, pro-German, guilty of treason, promoting sedition and accepting retainers from the enemy."

"The fact is, he has been true to his people; true to his government and has been the most able exponent of the wishes of the common man, either in or out of congress."

HOT-POINT PATIENT WANTS TO EAT

ESCANABA, Mich., March 7.—At the end of the seventeenth day of a baffling illness which has run her fever up to 114 degrees or more, Miss Evelyn Lyons, 39, sat up today in her chair, still protesting against her confinement and still maintaining the remarkable thermometer reading.

"I think I have the whole world beat on temperature," the girl told newspapermen, "but I am getting more or less tired of having the thermometers to 'eat' all the time. I am hungry and want something to eat."

According to Dr. Harry Defnet, the attending physician, the girl spent a fairly restful night although her strenuous protestations against confinement weaken her. Two United States tested thermometers from the local weather bureau which run up to 120 degrees will be used today to determine her exact temperature.

According to Ivan English, editor of the Escanaba Daily Mirror, two delicate thermometers, which were tested and approved by the United States bureau of standards to a reading of 120 degrees were used by Dr. Defnet and his assistants last night to determine the exact temperature of the girl. After taking the reading in every way known to medical science, Mr. English stated, it was found that Miss Lyons' temperature reached 115 degrees. Care was also taken against mistakes, Mr. English said, the readings on the thermometers being ground in glass so as to avoid contact with foreign substances.

SOCIALISTS BEATEN IN N. GUARD VOTE

MADISON, Wis., March 7.—(By the Associated Press.)—Overwhelming defeat met the Hirsch bill providing for the abolition of the Wisconsin National Guard when it reached the floor of the senate today. By a vote of 25 to 4, the upper house determined to indefinitely postpone the measure. The socialist members and Senator John Cashman, republican, voted against indefinite postponement.

FINDS NOTE IN PEELED POTATO

LYNCHBURG, Va., March 8.—Mrs. W. J. Crowder of this city, while peeling a potato yesterday, found a note in it reading:

"I got twenty-four cents per bushel. What did you give?" It was signed "G. F. Beardsley, Stanton, Mich." and was dated January 12.

Mrs. Crowder said she paid thirty cents per peck for the potatoes.

BONAR-LAW GOVT. GIVEN BODY BLOW IN BYE ELECTION

LONDON, March 8.—(By the Associated Press.)—The excitement aroused in the house of commons and political clubs over the defeat of John Walter Hills, financial secretary of the treasury, in a parliamentary bye-election, spread to the general public today when the result became known through the newspapers.

Aside from the unprecedented defeat of three ministers in succession, only a few months after the new government came into power, the significance of the breach in the solid conservative phalanx of Liverpool impresses the public.

Mr. Hills was defeated in the Edge Hill division of that city by a plurality of about 1000 votes. The seat was won by J. H. Hayes, the labor candidate, who is said to have been surprised at his victory.

With the exception of the Scotland division of Liverpool, which the veteran nationalist, Thomas O'Connor, has represented since 1885, every one of Liverpool's eleven divisions has been represented by a conservative for many years.

Sir W. W. Rutherford, the sitting member for Edge Hill, who retired to provide a seat for Mr. Hills has been returned by large majorities in every election for the past twenty years.

Only 58 per cent of the electorate voted yesterday. This showing is generally attributed to the refusal to support a nominee of the government whose policy on the house question and some other issues is held in profound disapproval by a faction of the conservatives.

Another factor in Mr. Hills' defeat was the women's vote.

Mr. Hills' defeat is regarded as a staggering blow at the government, eclipsing the results of the Mitcham and Willesden bye-elections, in which Sir Arthur Griffith-Boscawen and Lieutenant Colonel G. F. Stanley, both members of the government, were defeated.

Mr. Hayes, the new member, is a former London policeman.

D. S. C. AWARDED TO ASST. SECY. OF WAR

WASHINGTON, March 8.—Two days before Dwight F. Davis took oath on Monday as assistant secretary of war and within an hour became acting secretary on the departure of Secretary Weeks for Florida, war department machinery ground out final action on a citation that awarded Mr. Davis a distinguished service cross for gallantry in action in France.

The citation says that Lieutenant Colonel Davis displayed "extraordinary heroism in action" near Baulny, France, September 29-30, 1918, while acting as adjutant of the 68th infantry brigade, when he volunteered to go over the brigade's sector under heavy machine gun fire and reorganize the positions.

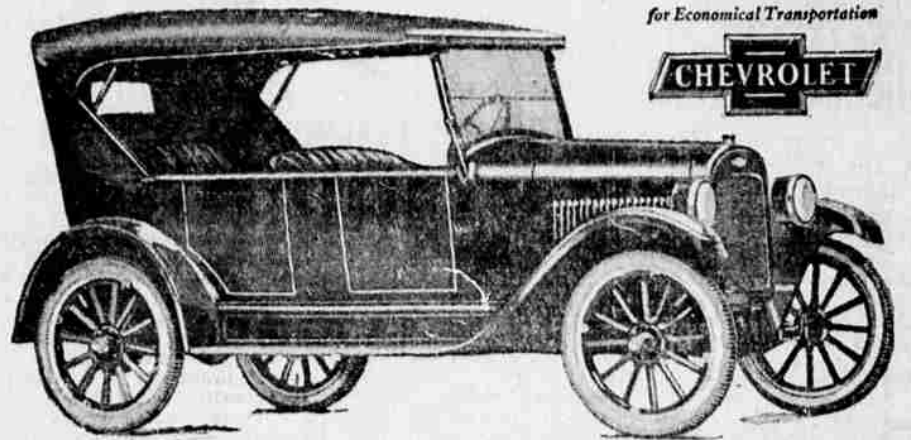
