FARM EXCHANGE HAS BEEN GREAT HELP TO FARMER

Let us forget—a human trait that is altogether too prevalent with many of our good American farmers—let us recall some of the worth while accomplishments of our Farm Bureau working through our local institution, the Farm Bureau Exchange.

From nothing in a few years our Farm Bureau Exchange has grown to an institution that can be considered an institution rather than a feed store and its benefits to the community and to the farmers in general of the county cannot be estimated in dollars and cents. It acts as a stabilizer for all farm products and covers a wide field. Its trade activities for the past year and business handled will amount to over \$180,000.

Farmers have been benefited in many lines including livestock, both beef and feeder stock, hogs, mutton, sheep, breeding animals of all kinds, wool and mohair, poultry, including turkeys, chickens, eggs, feeds and seeds of all kinds, spray materials, fertilizers and many other articles. Space will not permit mention of all benefits derived. Only a few will be covered in this article.

Wool and Mohair Marketing
The Farm Bureau and the Exchange have always worked to encourage the wool and mohair men to join the state-wide organization and market their wool and mohair through the state association. There are still some farmers who have small amounts of wool and mohair who do not belong to the association but can, through the marketing connections of the Farm Bureau Exchange, receive a premium for their products by dealing with the Exchange. During the past and present seasons a very substantial margin is paid to the small flock owner by the Exchange over what he could receive from independent buyers.

Marketing of Wheat

For the past few years the wheat production of Jackson county has just about equalled the consumption in the county but until the Exchange came into the field a large quantity of wheat was shipped out each year and about an equal amount of wheat or its by-products were shipped back into the county. Through the efforts of the management of the Exchange the farmers, for the past year or two and at present, are receiving about 2½¢ per bushel more for their wheat than they would if they sold to outsiders. About the only wheat that is shipped out of the county at the present time is off-grade stuff, with smut, or low grade milling wheat that cannot be handled to advantage in the county. On account of the Exchange the farmer received the terminal price plus the freight for their products. A year ago 33 cars of wheat were shipped out of the county and about 33 cars of wheat or the equivalent were shipped back into the county at a loss of about 40¢ per bushel to this community. Why not give the Farm Bureau Exchange the credit for this saving which is being made at the present time. The Exchange provides a bonded warehouse and wheat should be held in the county either on the farms or in warehouses and fed to the consumers as it is needed, thereby stabilizing the market and at the same time providing a much higher price for the product.

Barley Situation

Due to the efforts of the Exchange in building up a feed business, preparing various kinds of feed mixtures, all of the barley grown in the county can be used at home. During the past year over six hundred tons of corn were shipped in from eastern states used to take the place of barley which should be grown in our county. Over a thousand tons of corn were shipped into the district between Grants Pass and Ashland. The Exchange is rapidly gaining the reputation for mixed feeds and with the proper support from the farmers in a short time will be supplying the bulk of the balanced dairy, poultry and hog feeds of this district and northern California. Why not have this kind of institution here at home instead of having these same products manufactured and shipped in from Portland?

Fruitgrowers Benefited

But very few of the fruit growers realize the saving that has been brought about to them by the Farm Bureau Exchange in the matter of spray materials. In 1921 the Exchange saved a number of fruitgrowers 1¢ per pound over the established price of arsenate of lead on a hundred thousand pounds. On this order alone over four thousand dollars was saved to the growers. In 1922 5¢ per pound was saved over the established price and again one hundred thousand pounds of arsenate of lead went out to the growers. The growers receiving this lead were not the only ones benefited as this deal brought down the price of lead to many of the other growers in the county who were dealing with other concerns, but the Farm Bureau Exchange should receive the credit for this work.

Livestock Profits

When the Exchange first took up the work of handling livestock for the farmers, independent buyers were working on a margin of 2½¢ over the Portland price and the Farm Bureau Exchange at that time charged 25¢ per hundred for handling hogs. At present the Exchange charges 10¢ per hundred and the average expense for handling is only 90¢ per hundred and for the past year or more, local butchers have been paying the Portland price for hogs and beef cattle, give

the Exchange the credit for stabilizing this market.

Improvement in Seed Grains and Grasses

To anyone who has watched the development of better grain and grass seeds, a common improvement along this line can be noticed. The farmers now are able to procure the highest type of seed grains and grass seeds at a much less cost than they did in former days and this work is only started. This year many of the farmers are planting certified seed grain and in a short time Jackson county may be noted as a source of certified seed of many varieties to be shipped into larger grain growing districts.

This institution belongs to the farmers and should be supported by the chambers of commerce of the county and must be supported by its farmer members.
