Obenchain, Klamath Falls, Ore., and George Obenchain, Central Point, Ore., and one grandchild, Burnell Pankey. LOWERING DUES BY INCREASING MEMBERS WINS

A recent issue of The Oregonian explained the plan and stated that it was the most ingenious undertaking of a Chamber of Commerce that had come under its notice.

LAND SALESMAN GETS FIVE YEARS

KANSAS CITY, Mo., March 12.—W. E. Stewart was sentenced to five years' imprisonment and to pay a fine of \$1,600 by Federal Judge Arba S. Van Valkenburg here today. He was convicted February 28 by a jury in federal court here on a charge of using the mails to defraud in the sale of land in Hidalgo county, Texas.

Judge Van Valkenburg placed the sentence at five years on each of sixteen counts, but ruled that the prison sentences of the counts should run concurrently, making the total only five years. He was fined \$100 on each count. Five associates of Stewart, who were granted pleas of nolo contendere, were given fines ranging from \$250 to \$5,000.

TURN OVER SALMON CANNERY TO INDIANS

WASHINGTON, March 12.—Approval of a contract which in the next five years will turn over to the Indians living on Annette Island, Alaska, the large modern fish cannery operating in that locality, was announced today by Secretary Work.

The agreement entered into by the Annette Island Packing company, present owners of the plant, provides that royalties of from 3 to 10 cents on each salmon shall be paid to the Indians and that supplemental royalties accruing to the natives shall be invested in the property so that absolute title will be acquired by them within five years.

CHARGE MEN KILL FIVE DEER ON THE LOWER ROGUE

GRANTS PASS, March 12.—With a charge of killing five deer lodged against them, Hugh Swift and P. Patton of Junction City, will be returned here from Eugene, where they are now in the Lane county jail. The two men were apprehended Saturday night at about 11 o'clock by District Game Warden Ed Hawker of Lane county, on advice from Warden George Bancroft of this city. It is said that 160 pounds of venison were found on the men, the meat to be turned over to state hospitals and other institutions, where it can be used.

The men were in the vicinity of Whiskey Creek on the lower Rogue for several weeks, presumably inspecting the El Wilda mine. According to officers the men were in reality on a hunting trip and late last Friday night made two trips to Alameda. They left there at midnight on Friday and aroused the suspicions of the officers by their movements. It was brought to the attention of Game Warden Bancroft who notified all of the traffic officers along the route north.

The officers are elated at the arrests as they believe it will help much in the curbing of the unlawful killing of deer, should convictions be obtained. It is through the cooperation of the people of the districts in which the hunting is going on that the hunters can be located, says Mr. Bancroft.

Local officers will go to Eugene to bring back the two men to stand trial in this county. Mr. Hawker suffered a broken arm when he slipped on the pavement while searching the car.

LIVESTOCK HOPE IN BOYS' GIRLS' CLUBS

SPOKANE, Mar. 12.—The greatest hope for the future of the livestock industry lies in the boys' and girls' club movement, O. M. Plummer, manager of the Pacific International Livestock exposition of Portland declared here today at the opening session of the annual Pacific Northwest Livestock conference.

"Sooner or later every class of livestock must come back," Mr. Plummer said. "The average for the period from 1901 to 1921, according to our records at Portland, was good. Don't think in terms of one, five or ten years. Learn to think in terms of a generation and you will see the livestock industry in a brighter light." The conference will close tonight.

CALL AIRPLANES TO PREVENT N. Y. FLOOD

PORT GERVAIS, N. Y., March 12.—The 14,000 citizens of Port Gervais today were pinning their hopes of safety from flood waters upon promised arrival later today of a squadron of army planes to drop 3,600 pounds of bombs upon the ice jam in the Delaware river.

The water mark was hourly creeping higher. Cellars in the eastern residential district have been flooded and in some cases the water has reached the level of floors of homes and business houses.

The danger was increased, it was pointed out, by a huge ice jam at Susquehanna, 140 miles up the river, which has given indications of breaking at any moment.

According to the alleged confessions, Smith shot Lorenz dead as the bank clerk was handing over 25 cents in a holdup.

The two youths, who were mounted on bicycles, fled, according to the confessions, without searching the pockets of Lorenz.

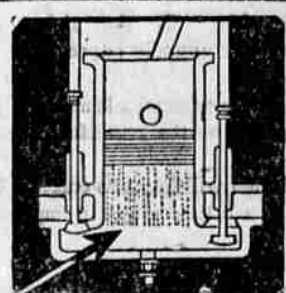

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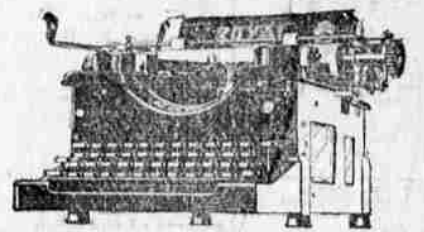
