FIRPO KNOCKS OUT B. BRENNAN AFTER AN UPHILL FIGHT

NEW YORK, Mar. 13.—Luis Angel Firpo was established today in the front rank of heavyweight title contenders. The big man from Argentina last night hurdled the first obstacle in the path leading to a match with Jack Dempsey, the champion, when he knocked out Bill Brennan, scarred veteran of the ring, in the twelfth round of a spectacular fifteen round match at Madison Square Garden.

Bewildered by a steady flow of blood from a gash over his left eye and held at bay by Brennan's crafty defensive ability and ring generalship, the South American staged a furious come-back in the twelfth round to end the bout with dramatic suddenness.

It was but the third time in a long and embattled career that Brennan has been knocked out. Both previous knockouts were administered by Dempsey, once in 1915 and again in 1920.

Firpo was today regarded by critics as the most formidable heavyweight contender discovered since Dempsey fought his way to the top. Though still crude and unpolished in his footwork, boxing ability and ring generalship, the South American demonstrated that he possesses courage, stamina, ability to absorb punishment and most important of all, a terrific right hand.

The South American's next engagement according to Promoter Tex Rickard, is likely to be against the winner of the Floyd Johnson-Jess Willard match, to take place at the Yankee stadium May 12, with the probability that the winner will meet Dempsey.

JAKE SCHAEFER LEADING HOPPE

NEW YORK, Mar. 13.—Only by a marvelous comeback in the two remaining blocks of 500 points each can Willie Hoppe retain his title of 182 lb. line billiard against the assault of Jake Schaefer of San Francisco.

The challenger easily won the first block of the title tournament last night 500 to 277.

Young Jake had a lead of 223, averaging 41.8-12 with high runs of 139 and 100, compared with the champion's average of 23½ and high runs of 94 and 44.

BUENOS AIRES, Mar. 13.—(By Associated Press). Buenos Aires went wild last night when the news was received that Luis Angel Firpo had knocked out Bill Brennan in New York. Thousands of persons marched through the streets of the city, shouting, singing and hailing Firpo as the world's future champion.

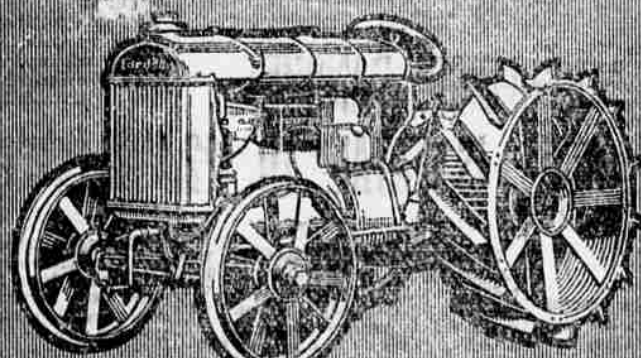
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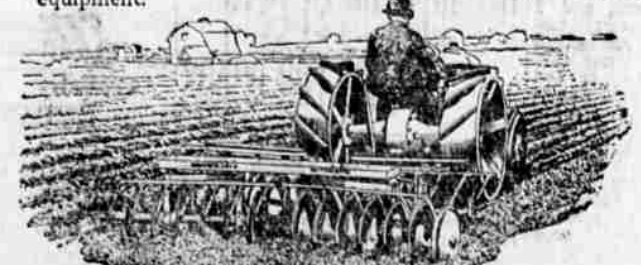
