

## BULLIS LUMBER MILL SOLD, WORK TO START SOON

The Southern Oregon Lumber company mill, situated near the Brownlee Mill on the northeast outskirts of the city, has been purchased by J. K. Elder, an experienced lumberman, from the Willamette Valley. The mill, which formerly was operated by Bullis and Skewis, has a capacity of sixty thousand feet per day and will be put into operation within the next sixty days with a crew of about 25 men.

The plant will be operated under the name of the Siskiyou Lumber company. Work will begin at once to put the machinery in first class shape and logs will be hauled from the Butte Falls district over the Brownlee-Olds Lumber company's railroad. The mill is expected to operate at capacity as soon after the start of operations as possible.

Mr. Elder is an experienced lumberman, having been in the business for a number of years in the Coeur d'Alene district, in the coast district near Tillamook, and in the Willamette valley.

DENVER, March 12.—George L. Reamy, confessed bunco steerer and bookmaker and the state's star witness against twenty alleged confidence men on trial here, testified today that A. W. Duff, one of the alleged managers of the confidence ring, told confidence men and bunco workers here that police protection for confidence men working in Denver in 1920, 1921, and 1922 was "ironclad."

"He said if anyone was pinched he'd get out," Reamy declared. Duff told the workers, Reamy yesterday gave a list of victims whose losses totaled \$238,420.

## MEDFORD WOMEN HEARTILY ENDORSE C. OF COMMERCE

The list of organizations whose leaders have expressed their willingness to co-operate with the campaign is as follows: The Greater Medford club, the Central Council of the Parent-Teachers' association, Presbyterian Women's association, Baptist Aid society, Methodist Episcopal Aid society, Episcopal Guild, St. Anne's Altar society, South Methodist Aid society, Christian Church association, The E'ks' Ladies, the Young Women's Christian association, and the Women's Christian Temperance union.

"We hope to have many more women join the chamber this year than ever before," states Mrs. Scheffelin. "Under the plan that will be carried out for the rebate of dues to all paid up members, we should be able to attract many women who have heretofore considered the dues to the Chamber of Commerce too high. Medford women should be as vitally interested in the progress of the community as the men are."

## FEAR SEATTLE FREIGHTER IS NOW A TOTAL LOSS

SEATTLE, March 12.—All efforts to float the stranded Argonaut line freighter Sagadahoc from the rocks off Shannon point, Rosario strait, early today failed today, according to wireless messages received here and it was believed the entire cargo of the vessel would have to be lightered. The Sagadahoc went ashore Friday night, cutting a large hole in her bow and flooding the forward part of the ship.

Work of lightering the cargo began Sunday and will probably be completed tomorrow. The cargo is being brought to Seattle on barges.

give both sides a fair trial, and was queried by the defense on legal points involved.  
Mr. Webster said he only read the headlines of the papers, and had taken no interest in the cases. Color issues did influence him, and he knew none of the principals or witnesses. He had no prejudices against the attorney general's office, and was not opposed to circumstantial evidence.

David Force of the Meadows, said he had known Henry Johnson, the "party" motif "all his life," but knew of nothing in that acquaintance that would influence him. He also had known Defendant Norris and family for several years, but this would not affect his verdict.

When court recessed at noon, 18 veniremen had been questioned, and six had been excused for cause and opinions.

Counsel for the defense forecasts that the case will take the better part of three days, with one day devoted to the securing of a jury.

## COURT INTERFERES WITH DEFENSE IN RADICAL TRIAL

ST JOSEPH, Mich., March 12.—(By the Associated Press.)—Concentrating on the women members of the venire, Humphreys Gray, associated with Frank P. Walsh in the defense of William Z. Foster, charged with violating Michigan's anti-syndicalism law, continued today to probe their definitions of words and terms used by radical leaders.

Mr. Gray's effort to define "bourgeoisie" as the "great middle class," provoked a clash with O. L. Smith, assistant attorney general of Michigan, who asked the defense to give the prospective jurors the radicals' definition of the capitalist class.

Foster's attorney referred to his client as "the man who, more than any other man that ever lived," brought about the great "reforms in the packing industry at Chicago," and who "came nearer than anyone else to organizing the workers in the steel industry."

Judge White interfered when Mr. Gray started to read excerpts from writings of Thomas Jefferson on the fundamental right of engaging in revolution to overthrow oppressive governments and the court held the quotations were not germane in this case.

Judge White interposed objections to the line of questioning again when the defense attorney asked a prospective juror if he would be prejudiced against a man who advocated the right of revolution. The court said the question involved the fundamental law in this case and that the defense had no right to ask it.

## MEDFORD TOSSERS TO PLAY ASTORIA FRIDAY AFTERNOON

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 12.—Teams representing the Athena and Salem high schools will open the Oregon state inter-scholastic athletic association basketball tournament, held under the auspices of Willamette University, here Thursday afternoon as the result of schedule drawings this morning by J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction, Professor F. M. Erickson and Athletic Director Roy Bohler, of the university.

The tournament play will continue through Friday and Saturday with the following games listed:

Friday afternoon—Medford vs. Astoria, and Tillamook vs. Myrtle Point.

Friday night—The Dalles vs. University high school, Eugene, and Joseph vs. the winner of the Salem-Athena game.

The semi-finals will be played off Saturday afternoon and the championship contest will be staged Saturday evening.

Nine teams, each representing one of the districts into which the state has been divided in the process of determining the best teams from each section, will participate in the tournament.
