

7 MEDFORDITES CAN'T BE SIGNED FOR CHAMBER C.

There are seven men in Medford whom the soliciting teams of the chamber of commerce membership campaign will be unable to sign up next week. No arguments which they can adduce can cause these doughty seven to put their names on the dotted line.

After a considerable debate by the members of the campaign committee it was decided to make public the names of these men. They are, P. S. Bramwell of the California Oregon Motor company; P. F. Burk of the Medford Tent and Awning Works; A. R. Mason and C. W. Barrett of the Mason Motor company; Theodore Wickson, manager of the Twentieth Century Grocery; George L. Forge, local representative of the Montana Life Insurance company; and Alphonse W. Aya, manager of the Columbia Tire corporation. They have already signed up in the chamber of commerce.

"It doesn't take me long to see a good thing," said Mr. Bramwell. "I wanted to beat the soliciting teams to it; so I just went into the chamber yesterday and signed up."

George L. Forge is leaving town to be away during the membership campaign. But he didn't want to be one of the last to sign up. So he went over to the chamber of commerce and became one of the first. Most of the early birds are newcomers in town.

BUILD NEW POWER LINE TO YREKA, CAL.

One of the pioneer hydro-electric lines in this section of the country will be sacrificed to progress this summer when the California-Oregon Power company reconstructs its line running from the Fall Creek power plant to Yreka. The present line is the original one built in 1903 by the Siskiyou Light and Power company and was the first long line to carry hydro-electric current in northern California.

The old equipment will be entirely replaced by new standard poles, wires and insulators, and a large part of the thirty-six mile right of way will be moved to a new location in order to make the line more accessible and easier to patrol. The voltage between Fall Creek and Montague, California, will be increased from 34,000, its present capacity, to 60,000.

FROBACH OUTLINES UNEMPLOYMENT JACKSON COUNTY

"The competent man, who is out of a job is an economic waste," declared Secretary H. O. Frobach, in an interesting talk on unemployment at the meeting of the Medford committee of the board of directors of the Jackson County Red Cross, held in the public library last evening.

Mr. Frobach went on to outline at length the unemployment situation in Medford and methods for taking care of it for the past three years.

Three years ago, he said, from three to ten men a day would call at the Chamber of Commerce, asking for jobs. At that time there was no systematized method for handling unemployment. The Chamber of Commerce and the Red Cross began working together toward this end and last year at the suggestion of Secretary Frobach the Red Cross assumed the responsibility of acting as employment agency for the community.

Since last fall this work has developed into a county wide employment agency. As indicated by the statistics published in the monthly report of the Red Cross work it is shown just how much service to the community the Red Cross renders by dovetailing the man and the job. Calls out of the state for employment have even been supplied through the Red Cross.

Owing to the fact, however, that many floaters or transient unemployed men pass through Medford, many of whom are not competent, there is always a certain amount of negligible material on the unemployment list.

Mr. Frobach has recently been appointed as chairman of the committee on employment for the Red Cross.

Mrs. H. L. Noblitt, chairman of the Red Cross committee on cooperation with the Public Health association, gave an interesting report on the recent Portland conference on public health, which as chairman of the Public Health association of Jackson county, she attended.

She emphasized the importance of care of the tubercular and of the menace to the community of having this dread disease stimulated through bad housing and poor living conditions.

Miss Haines, executive secretary, presented a report on the work accomplished by the Red Cross for the month of February, which shows the wide scope of the work, which has made many homes self-supporting, giving to children, men and women an opportunity for normal and wholesome living. The manager of the Thrift Shop, Mrs. C. F. Card, presented the month's report on the work of this useful and necessary department. Both these reports will be published in full.

Present were John C. Mann, chairman, in the chair; Mrs. A. J. Klockner, vice chairman; Rev. E. P. Lawrence, recording secretary; Mrs. J. C. S. Wells, chairman of the Red Cross committee on work with the handicapped; Mrs. L. E. Williams, chairman of the home service committee, and Supt. A. G. Smith and C. M. Kidd, Mayor E. C. Gaddis had planned to attend the meeting and sent his regrets that owing to another engagement he was unable to be present. Among the visitors present were J. C. S. Wells, Mrs. L. Crane, representing the P. T. A., Mrs. Ella M. Farrar and others.

MEDFORD LEGION PREPARING FOR STATE MEETING

At the request of members a review of benevolent work was given by American Legion post officials at the meeting last night and the hope was expressed that activities along this line might be increased through additional revenues from membership.

Post Commander C. Y. Tengwald gave a tentative outline of the program of the district conference which will be held here March 24th. The Oregon state department of the American Legion has divided the state into districts and meetings attended by all post officers and many members of such separate districts and state department officers have already been held at La Grande and The Dalles.

Representatives from fourteen posts will attend the Medford conference in addition to State Commander George R. Wilson and State Adjutant Harry N. Nelson. The visitors will include legionnaires from Klamath Falls, Ashland, Roseburg, Marshfield, Bandon, Grants Pass, North Bend, Coquille, Myrtle Point, Lakeview, Gold Hill, Reesport, Gold Beach and Paisley.

The Medford post officials intend to carry out a rapid fire program starting at 10 a. m. with roll call, while intensive study of Legion matters will occupy the morning session. At 1:30 the department commander and adjutant will take the meeting in hand and various officers will be given instruction in their work. Closer cooperation between posts and more efficient handling of welfare work among ex-service men is expected to result from the district conference.

In the evening a real hint of Medford hospitality will be given the visitors. A banquet will be served at a local hotel following which they will be guests of honor at the Oriental ball room where a big public dance will be given. Local legionnaires hope that Medford will be selected as the state convention place in the not distant future, the completion of the Armory making such a gathering possible, and with this idea in view a special effort will be made to impress the conference visitors.

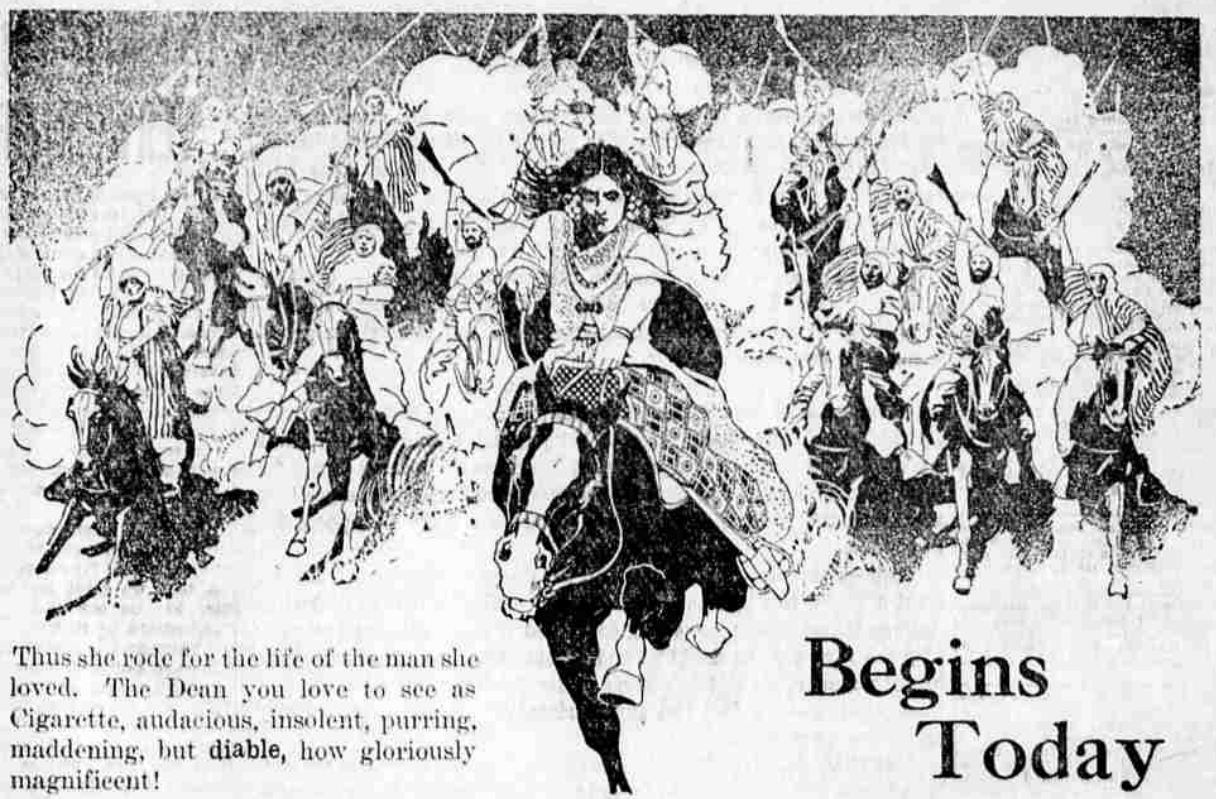
