ASHLAND D. A. R. WANTS PIONEER RELICS SENT IN

ASHLAND, March 14.—Here is an opportunity for all interested in historical relics to take a part in collecting such, thus assisting in a "roundup" of same under the auspices of the Daughters of the Revolution which is engaged in the work. It was hoped to perfect this collection on or before the 12th of this month, a specific purpose being in view, but in all probability the information desired as outlined herein will be welcome at any time. This request has been made by the national committee N. S. D. A. R. upon the local chapter, and refers to matters of historical research and preservation of records, and it would be considered a great favor if those who have in their possession any of the articles specified or know of such, to notify Mrs. H. W. Andrews of this city, the schedule of articles and records sought being enumerated in the following list:

I. Historic Art including (1) Paintings, (2) Marbles, (3) Bronze, (4) Mural art, (5) Oral tradition in art. The subjects depicted may be historical incidents from all periods of American history up to and including the Civil war. If original give name of artist or sculptor and where located.

II. Collections of historic manuscripts: where located.

III. Published histories: where located: (1) state, (2) county, (3) traditions of locality, origin.

IV. Records: colonial, revolutionary, pioneer. Simply list the name of the record and where filed. (1) Men, (2) Women, (3) Places, (4) Letters written in colonial, revolutionary or pioneer times. Just state by whom written and the present owner.

V. Pioneer graves in this locality. Cooperation is sought in order to make the exhibit as extensive as possible, and it is taken for granted that there is material enough available in any given community to make the showing an interesting one.

The entertainment will begin at eight o'clock.
