SPEND MORE ON FACES THAN ON SCHOOLS

CHICAGO, March 15.—The amount of money spent on face powder, cosmetics and perfumes last year was more than 50 per cent in excess of the total endowment of all universities and private colleges in the country, Ralph E. Hellman, dean of the Northwestern university school of commerce, declared today before the Chicago Association in Commerce.

"In view of these facts it cannot be said that American business has been overburdened for the support of education," he declared.
