HEADS, NOT YOUR
HEARTS JURY, SETS
MRS. WELLS FREE

MINEOLA, March 16.—With a smile on her face, Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Wells walked out of the court room early today, a free woman. Just before midnight she was acquitted of the murder of Captain James M. Pettit, with whom she lived at Massapequa Inn, which he kept.

The jury was out about five hours. Mrs. Wells' acquittal followed closely two convictions of women charged with having slain men with whom they had been intimate. In each case the trial jury was chosen because of a professed ability to judge testimony against women charged with murder with their heads rather than their hearts.

Her two predecessors, Mrs. Lillian Halzen and Mrs. Paulette Salades, unlike Mrs. Wells, admitted having shot their victims to death, but pleaded justification and mental instability. At all times Mrs. Wells maintained that she did not shoot Captain Pettit.

The basis of her defense was that she had no reason to punish Pettit. Her love for him was too great, she pleaded.

Miss Helen McCormick, one of Mrs. Wells' attorneys, told the jury the state had not established a motive against her client. The beatings Captain Pettit had given her had been cited. It was shown that he had taken all her savings, \$7,000 and squandered them, and frequently in delirium threatened to kill her.

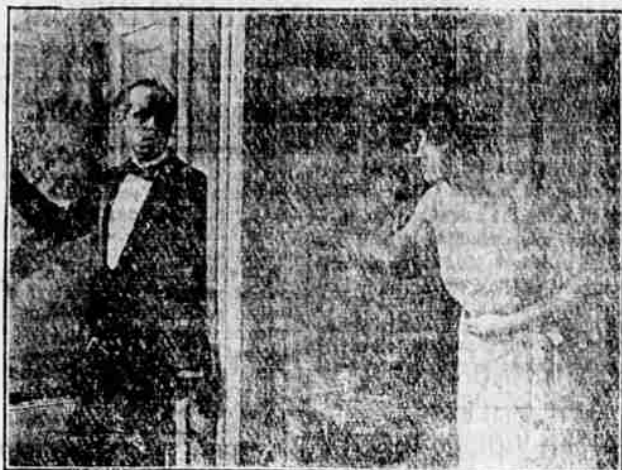

MIND BLANK SAYS
COOS BAY SLAYER

MARSHFIELD, Ore., March 16.—L. W. Pearce, on trial at Coquille on a charge of first degree murder, on the witness stand today told of killing his neighbor, James Culver. He claimed that his mind was blank concerning the death of his wife.

He declared he had been drinking moonshine and told of finding his wife dead. He then decided to kill his dogs and cats and to kill Culver, he testified, because he felt the latter had caused him trouble.

He said he realized that he had no right to kill Culver but at the time he had an overwhelming feeling to commit the murder. He gave details of going to Culver's house and shooting him twice. Pearce claims that because he was drunk, he was not clear on many points. He gave his testimony in a quiet manner without any show of nervousness.

INSANITY PLEA IN
MARSHFIELD CASE

MARSHFIELD, Ore., March 16.—The prosecution in the case of L. W. Pearce on the charge of slaying James Culver, his neighbor, today introduced in his trial at Coquille testimony of officers and others who told of the killing by Pearce of his wife and Culver. After Pearce had choked his wife to death he killed his cats and dogs and then killed Culver, said witnesses.

The defense made no effort to discredit the stories of the witnesses, indicating it would rely upon a plea that Pearce was insane when the murders were committed. Pearce was indicted on a charge of second degree murder in connection with his wife's death and first degree murder in Culver's case. He is being tried on the latter charge now.

NATION-WIDE HUNT
FOR EX. IMP. WIZARD

CLAIM IRISH PLOT
TO KILL L. GEORGE

LONDON, Mar. 16.—(By Associated Press.) Four men were executed today at Broom's castle, Stranorlar, county Donegal, says a Central News dispatch from Dublin.

LONDON, Mar. 16.—A sensational story of a plot by an Irish republican organization to murder British cabinet members and commit other outrages is printed today by the Daily Sketch.

The newspaper connects the alleged scheme with the activities of Irishmen recently arrested in Great Britain. It says the persons marked for assassination included Premier Bonar Law, David Lloyd George and Sir Hamar Greenwood.

A large number of women in the organization, the Sketch asserts, obtained employment in the households of the intended victims and thus became able to supply outside persons with details of the men's movements. The conspirators' plans, according to the newspaper, also provided for the creation of disturbances through the rougher elements in the larger cities.
