

M'DONALD FOUND GUILTY OF JAIL BREAK ASSAULT

Martin R. McDonald, alias McCabe, indicted for assault with a deadly weapon, to-wit, a window weight, in an attempted dash for liberty on the evening of February 2, last, was found guilty in the circuit court Thursday afternoon. McDonald walked Jailer Ed Collins behind the ear with the window weight, and only stunned that six-footer, who forced McDonald back in his cell and subdued him.

McDonald essayed to act as his own lawyer, but gave it up when about half through and Attorney W. R. Oatford was called to defend him. The defendant told the story of assault, about as it happened, with the exception, that just before he hit Collins, "everything became hazy." His recollection of the closing incidents were vague and dim.

McDonald was originally indicted for passing a forged bill of sale upon Edison C. (Jerry) Jerome of this city for an auto. The sheriff's office claims he is wanted at Vale, Ore., for a similar offense.

SPORT BRIEFS

TACOMA, March 15.—Joe Gorman, Portland featherweight, knocked out Frankie Britt of Tacoma, in the third round of the scheduled six-round main event of the smoker here last night.

Billy Young, Vancouver, B. C., 130 pounder, was awarded an unpopular decision over Johnny Mack of Pittsburgh at the end of the other six-round bout.

Chuck Hellman, Portland bantam, knocked out Frankie Green of Seattle in the fourth round of their four-round bout and Al Calvert, Tacoma flyweight, was given an unpopular draw with Frankie Grandetta of Portland. Most of the fans apparently favored Grandetta.

STRYCHNINE SAVES PAT DAILEY FROM DEATH ON TRIP

Patrick L. Dailey, district game warden of Jackson county is at the Community hospital recovering from a very serious attack of ptomaine poisoning, and owes his life to having had some emergency strychnine tablets in his pockets which he swallowed just before becoming delirious.

Mr. Dailey in the course of his duties far up the Rogue river late last Tuesday, started for home in his car and then decided to stop at Kelley's island and eat a meal, before continuing his journey. After eating some canned food along with other edibles he became very ill—so sick he could not leave.

Becoming worse he swallowed the tablets which he always carries in case he should run across some coyotes swimming in the river, and made himself as comfortable as possible, lying down. All that night, whenever rational, Pat expected almost every minute to be his last, and ever and anon kept repeating his Elix's oath—too sick to think of anything else religious.

Late Wednesday forenoon he had recovered sufficiently so that by exerting all his will power he feebly entered his car and drove to this city, where he was at once taken to the hospital and attended by physicians. This noon he was reported out of danger.

NEW YORK BEAUTY THOUGHT SLAIN

NEW YORK, March 15.—A "big fellow" and his secretary were sought today in connection with the mysterious death of Dorothy King, an artist's model in her apartment on west 57th street.

Elevator operators said that two men known to them as the "big fellow" and his secretary, visited there the night before her death. Miss King, who is described as one of the city's most beautiful girls, was found dead in her bed by a maid.

An empty chloroform bottle was found near the body. The police believed Miss King was murdered, but admit she may have committed suicide.

TRIO FEEL AX IN SALEM OFFICES

SALEM, Ore., March 15.—Horace Sykes, Salem, inspector of the fire marshal's department, and John Collier, Portland attorney, in charge of legal work of the insurance department, have been relieved of their duties by the new insurance commissioner, W. H. Moore.

T. A. Reinhart, Salem, has been appointed secretary of the state tax commission.

MME. GADSKI SUES NEW YORK PAPER

NEW YORK, Mar. 15.—Mme. Johanna Gadski Tauscher, prima donna, has filed suit for libel in the supreme court here against the New York Tribune and its musical critic, Henry E. Krehbiel, for \$250,000 damages each, alleging that an article printed in the newspaper last month greatly injured her in her reputation and profession.

The alleged libelous matter, as described in the Tribune's account of the suit today is based on an illusion in Mr. Krehbiel's article to the sinking of the Lusitania and a subsequent celebration at the home of "one of the singers of opera." The article did not mention Madame Gadski or her husband, Captain Hans Tauscher, but she contends she was referred to.

Tauscher who was agent for the Krupp in the United States was acquitted on a charge of conspiring to violate the neutrality of the United States early in the war.

ALL OUT, BURDEN OF GERMAN ANSWER

BERLIN, Mar. 15.—(By Associated Press.) Germany's unofficial response to the recent announcement that France and Belgium will evacuate the occupied regions as fast as Berlin makes tangible guarantees asserts that only a complete withdrawal of the allies will make possible any negotiations.

This opinion so far has been expressed only in the press and in reichstag circles, but it is known that editors and politicians alike have been informed by the government that any negotiations on the reparations question are conditional upon the return of the Ruhr to German control.

Political writers familiar with the attitude of Wilhelmstrasse say that they have heard nothing of the reported German overture to London. Any intimations of peace suggestions that appeared in the Berlin press came from outside sources.

DOUR SCOTS OPPOSE EATING WITH KING

LONDON, March 15.—(By the Associated Press.)—The four Scots of the labor party in the house of commons have sternly renounced participation in any royal functions. Most of them yesterday signed a declaration that they would accept no invitation to such affairs "while there is so much unemployment" in their constituencies.

Only about half dozen of the Scottish laborites withheld their signatures, the Times says. The English members of the party were not asked to sign, but it is understood they are about equally divided on the question.

FIND ANOTHER CLUE IN FATHER VRANIAC CASE

VIRGEN, Ill., Mar. 15.—(By Associated Press.) Several new developments in the case of Father John A. Vranjak, pastor of the Sacred Heart Catholic church here, who disappeared a week and a half ago were announced today by George Miller, deputy sheriff of Macoupin county.

Mrs. Johanna Vranjak, mother of the missing priest said she had received a letter from a woman in Dubuque, Iowa, who declared that her brother, the Rev. Arthur B. Belknap, a priest at Lead, S. D., had been slain by a man whose description she supplied.

Deputy Sheriff Miller declared the description of this alleged slayer of Father Belknap corresponds with that of a man who is being kept under surveillance in a town near here.

CHINK COOK POISONS RICE, 27 STUDENTS DEAD

SHANGHAI, Mar. 15.—(By Associated Press.) Twenty-seven students and teachers at the normal school at Hang Chow are dead and ten more are in a precarious condition as the result of eating rice poisoned by two disgruntled cooks who had been discharged, according to evidence at the official investigation of the deaths today.

Chien Ah LL, one of the cooks, testified that his fellow conspirator Pi Ho-Bong stole a bottle containing a white powder from the chemical laboratory of the school last Saturday and dumped the entire contents into the rice.

Following the serving of the rice at Saturday's supper 200 students and 50 teachers became violently ill.

PARSONS, Kas.—An operation performed on J. A. Malmgren disclosed 27 spoons and several small pieces of wood in his stomach.

ESTIMATE INCOME TAX \$400,000,000

WASHINGTON, Mar. 15.—The first installment of income and profits taxes covering the calendar year 1922, due today, was estimated by treasury officials at about 400,000,000 dollars. That figure, officials explained, is subject to great uncertainty since collections for the most part will be based on 1922 and will show the full effect of changes made by the revenue act of 1921.

GERMAN WHO STABBED U. S. SOLDIER IS FREED

LEAVENWORTH, Kas., Mar. 15.—Peter Ackerman, who although a German citizen, was convicted by court martial and sent from his native country to the federal penitentiary here to serve fifteen years for stabbing a United States soldier was free today and on his way back to Germany.

Ackerman was released yesterday upon commutation of service after serving three years. Ackerman was a resident of Cologne city. He attacked a soldier who is alleged to have been assaulting Ackerman's sister. The German government became interested in the case, it is said, setting up the claim that Ackerman had a right to defend his sister, especially in his own home.

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 15.—That a bottle containing a deadly poison was found at the state penitentiary wood camp near Marion where moonshine was alleged to have been "planted" so that it would be found by convicts, was declared today by Warden Johnson S. Smith, who announced yesterday that he was asking for a grand jury investigation of alleged tampering with prisoners by outside forces in aiding escapes.

ENGLAND MAKES FIRST PAYMENT

WASHINGTON, March 15.—The first payment by the British government under the recently negotiated debt refunding agreement will be made today at the New York federal reserve bank.

Although the formal agreement has not yet actually been signed, the London government made known its desire to make at once the \$4,128,085 payment necessary to reduce the debt to an even \$4,500,000,000, the figure upon which the 62 year funding plan was calculated.
