The sewing school being held in the Carnegie library the past three weeks under the Vocational Trades union and high school with Edmund Gurney of Portland, Ore., as instructor, closed Friday.

Some twenty ladies took advantage of this great opportunity to receive instruction under Mr. Gurney who is considered the best designer and ladies' tailor in the United States.

Nineteen garments were made as follows: Ten tailored suits, four coats, two one-piece dresses, two three-piece suits, and three model coats, besides instruction given in cutting and fitting.

Mr. Gurney has on the market a simplified chart of his own invention as well as the Tenor Sure Fit dress and is also the author of several books on advanced dressmaking.

The ladies of the class served dinner Friday noon in the class room in honor of Mr. Gurney who left Friday evening for Portland.

Guests of the class were Mrs. Wade of the Wade Sewing School and Prof. Smith, supt. of Medford schools.
