THE MEDFORD Chamber of Commerce has everything but membership. It has splendid organization, a fine enthusiasm, a good record of accomplishment, a high grade of ability in its executive and administrative departments.

But it hasn't the membership an organization of its kind should have. Tomorrow the drive for increased membership starts. MEDFORD BANKS
GIVE LIBERALLY
TO CHAMBER C.

All four banks in Medford have accepted the suggestion for their subscription to the publicity and service fund of the Chamber of Commerce for the next three years, according to a report of the committee, headed by B. E. Harder, which prepared the fund. The combined subscription of the four banks amounts to \$1050 annually.

The publicity and service committee compiled a suggested list of subscriptions which it believed that every corporation and business house in Medford could afford to pay to the fund and which would be willing to do so by reason of the fact that they would be especially benefited by the activities of the chamber. The bankers are the first to approve officially their quota and have stated that the publicity and service fund committee has made very equitable estimates for subscriptions from all the business men.

Chairman Bert Thierolf of the committee on relations with other organizations, announces that on Saturday night the Redmen's lodge gave unanimous approval to the membership campaign and appointed a committee to co-operate with the campaign organization. The full list of endorsers of the campaign now is: The Craters, the Elks, the Presbyterian Men's club, the Stanford club of southern Oregon, the Copco Foundation, the Rogue River Valley University club, the Electrical Contractor dealers, the Knights of Columbus, the Knights of Pythias, the Odd Fellows, the Oregon Growers, the American Legion, the Ministerial Union, the Woodmen of the World, the Masons, and the Redmen.

Besides these, all of the women's organizations in the city have promised to co-operate with the campaign committee according to Mrs. Ross G. Schieffelin, chairman of the committee on relations with women's clubs.

NOON LUNCHEONS
DURING DRIVE

All the team workers in the membership campaign of the Chamber of Commerce as well as new members of the chamber will have luncheon at the hotel Medford on the three days of the campaign. The soliciting teams will work from 9 to 12 in the morning and will meet at the hotel immediately as guests of the chamber to give their reports.

Tomorrow morning at 9 all the team captains will assemble their teams at the Chamber of Commerce building to receive their report sheets and to give to their men final instructions as to the work of soliciting.

"It is quite necessary," states Harry L. Walther, chairman of the soliciting committee, "that every one of the workers be present at these luncheons. We invite the new members of the chamber to come also. Reports on the work for each day will be received at that time and we will get an idea on what each team is doing."

EXIDE BATTERY
ON 'TIGER SHARK'

Considerable attention was attracted during the day by the appearance on the streets of Pilot "Al" C. Reed seated in his Texas "Tiger Shark," a Buick with a large shark's head on the radiator and a long tail attached to the rear.

Pilot Reed is on the third and last lap of a 400,000 mile international endurance race and hopes to win the \$25,000 wager which is offered by the Revel Athletic association of Paris, France.

He started out in 1916, but was delayed by the war and made a new start on March 26, 1922, having completed 335,978 miles to date covering 37 foreign countries and 48 states in the U. S. To check the run and mileage, his motor is sealed in three places and watched by timers from America, France and Italy. According to the rules he must carry a party of four including two official timers and a recording secretary, who send in reports twice weekly.

His car has regular equipment, including an Exide battery which is now 7 years old and still giving excellent service.
