For the Bryan group must have a candidate who can flourish where it is dry, and the Taggart-Murphy-Brennan group must have a candidate who can flourish where it is wet. Mr. Bryan will insist upon a farm bloc progressive, and Messrs. Underwood and Davis will insist upon safe and sane business timber.

So there you are. And there are the Democrats, with Mr. Bryan as usual far removed from the environs of that Wilsonian cocked hat. The Republicans have no picnic in prospect, with formidable opponents like LaFollette and Brookhart in ambush. But the Democrats face nothing short of civil war.

SOCIALIST TEST IN PARLIAMENT PROVES FIZZLE

LONDON, Mar. 21.—(By Associated Press). The test between labor and the government over Philip Snowden's motion for legislation designed to supersede the capitalist system by a socialist order has been postponed to allow another debate after the Easter recess.

Last evening's discussion found the government solidly supported by all parties in the house except the laborites. The debate was largely academic and there was no unusual incident. Many of the most prominent labor leaders were unable to take part, having gone to Paris as delegates to the socialist conference on the Ruhr situation.

Mr. Snowden, asserting that capitalism and not socialism was called to account, said that the existing order had failed to make the most of the productive power and natural resources.

Mr. Snowden reminded the house that the labor party in parliament had grown from four members to at least 110 members. He added that the laborites would continue their efforts.

An independent liberal amendment offered by Sir Alfred Mond, asserted that although Mr. Snowden had reasoned carefully, he had failed to show that the socialist system would not be the victim of such ills as were alleged to have befallen the people under the capitalist regime.

Sir Alfred declared that it was impossible to carry on industry through a government department and that socialism meant conscription of labor.

35 MILE SPEED IS VETOED BY HART

OLYMPIA, Wash., Mar. 21.—A provision to increase the speed limit on state highways to thirty-five miles an hour from thirty, was vetoed by Governor Hart yesterday because of a legal flaw, the remainder of the measure being approved.

The final day for disposition by the governor of bills passed by the 1922 session of the legislature resulted in approval of eleven measures, the veto of three in whole or in part and the transmittal of the remaining 24 to the secretary of state to become law without the executive signature.

The governor vetoed house bill 64 limiting the personal property exemption for taxation purpose household goods and wearing apparel on the ground that it attempted to classify property exemptions and was therefore unconstitutional.
