COMMITTEE FINDS CHIEF SPANISH WAR VETERAN ASLEEP

Commander-in-chief Entenza of the Spanish War Veterans, who is on a swing around the Pacific coast from the east, passed through the city this morning en route from San Francisco to Portland on the Shasta train due at 8.41. he was to have met here during the stop by a committee of the local post of veterans of the Spanish American war.

The committee was on hand to shake hands and tell the distinguished visitor about our beautiful valley and the C. of C. drive, but could only cuss fate and snarl at J. J. Buchter, for not arriving, as usual, until after the train pulled out. Commander Entenza was still asleep in his berth. The committee consisted of Colonel W. H. Paine, retired army officer, and those two grizzled retired army sergeants, Gustav Weston and Alex Sparrow, who gained fame during that war in the Philippines by putting to flight a band of several hundred vicious head hunters and chasing them several miles, armed only with soup bones from the kitchen and up-to-date army language. Corporal Buchter, the delayed commander of the committee, also gained much prominence in the Philippines by his service in the sutler's department and ably rendered K. P. duties.

O. A. C. ORCHESTRA TO PLAY AT DANCE
