WHY A REFERENDUM?

A STATE referendum on the new income tax, gasoline tax and
aleomargarine bill is proposed. If the movement is successful
the state will be plunged into the expense and disruptive agitation
of another election.

The Mail Tribune can see no good reason for such action. These
measures were all duly passed by the recent legislature and signed
by the governor. Certain interests opposed these measures, the issues
were fully discussed, but the representatives of the people of the
state, after many days of investigation and discussion, decided that
the bills should be enacted into law.

Unless our entire system of representative government is to be
abandoned these measures should be left alone, at least until their
alleged defects can be demonstrated in actual practice.

The Referendum is an emergency measure. It should supplement
representative government, not replace it. No one can tell how any
of these measures will work out until they have been enforced. Try
them out first, and then if the claims of their opponents are substantiated,
a referendum would not only follow as a natural consequence,
but there would be some prospect of success.

Stirring up the animals now promises to benefit no one. Those
who oppose any income tax for example, and who are undoubtedly
supplying the motive power for the present referendum, might find
that a mild law like the present one, is at least preferable to a drastic
law which might replace it.

Test out the laws first, before initiating the referendum, or else
abolish the legislature entirely and let the people write their own
laws. We fail to see any emergency justifying the referendum on
these three measures, which were only passed by the legislature and
signed by the governor, three or four weeks ago.

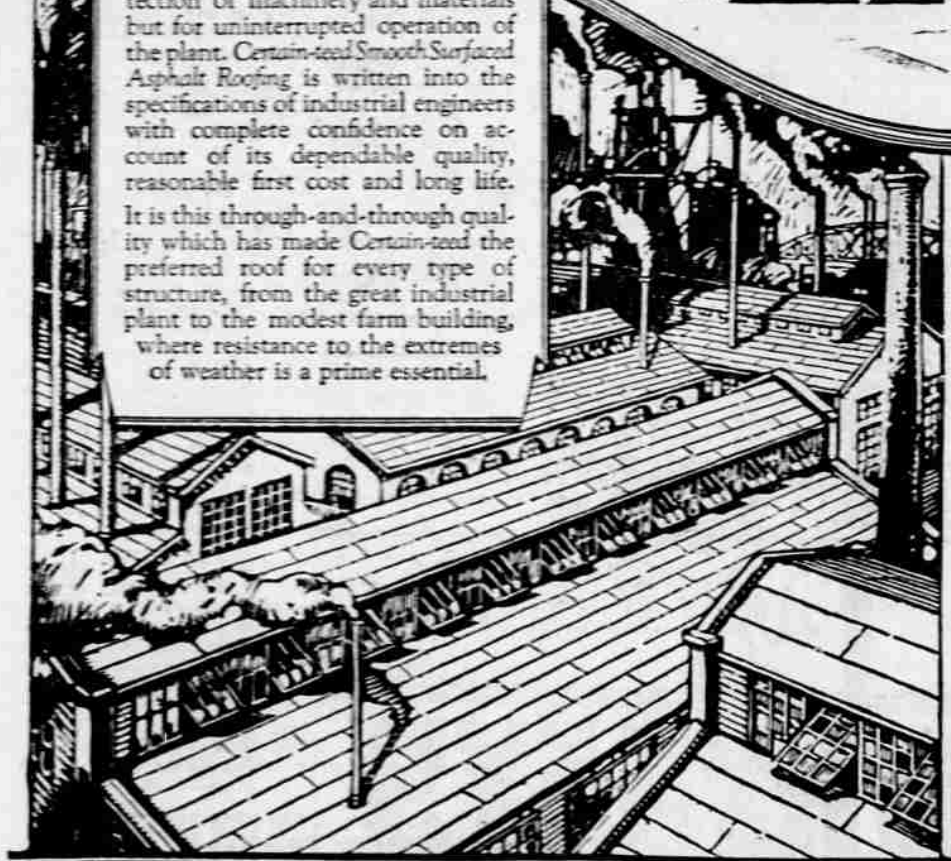
