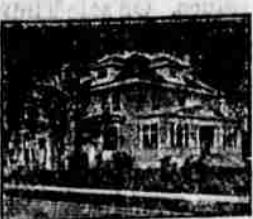
Portland papers are briefly advertising the circumstance that "Ashland has a population of 4282, has 9045 books in its library which have a circulation of 43,017."
