

COPCO TO FORM NEW SERVICE TO AID INDUSTRY

The California-Oregon Power company will shortly inaugurate a new service in its organization which will have as its purpose the development of new industries in all the territory of southern Oregon and northern California now served by its power lines.

The activity of this service, which will be called the New Industries Department, will cover the whole field of commercial development. It will work in close harmony with the chambers of commerce of the various communities located in the territory served by the company.

William H. Crawford, at present manager of the Department of Industries of the Portland chamber of commerce, has been placed in charge and will undertake the work of organizing this department. He will move to the home office of the California-Oregon Power company in Medford to take up his new duties within a few weeks, as he has considerable work to complete for the Portland chamber with whom he has been connected for the last six years.

"Our organization has been influenced to take this step," stated H. L. Walther, division manager for the power company, "largely because of the success of similar departments of leading eastern utilities. The Baltimore and Ohio railroad and the Alabama Power company and a number of others have employed it to great advantage. We are not altruists, but our people believe that this service will benefit all of southern Oregon and northern California fully as much as it will the California-Oregon Power company."

'GLORIOUS GLORIA' SEEKS DIVORCE

LOS ANGELES, March 29.—Gloria Swanson, motion picture actress, sued for divorce yesterday by Herbert K. Somborn, who charged her with desertion, had made no statement on the suit early today, but friends recalled her declaration after their separation nearly two years ago that "she was through with married life," and henceforth would devote her life to her child and the films.

The child, Gloria Swanson Somborn, two and a half years old, will remain with her mother, it is reported, regardless of the outcome of the divorce action.

The complaint states they were married December 20, 1919, and separated May 15, 1921.

At the time of their marriage, Somborn gave his age as 36 and Miss Swanson's as 30.

Miss Swanson was first married to Wallace F. Reery, motion picture actor, in February, 1916. He divorced her on the ground of desertion in December, 1918.

ANOTHER STRIKE OF COAL MINERS

SEATTLE, March 29.—Upon the outcome of a conference to be held in Washington, D. C., either late today or tomorrow between representatives of the United Mine Workers of America, including Martin Flynn, president of the Washington state district and President Harding's coal fact-finding commission will depend whether union coal miners of Washington will walk out Saturday midnight, according to union officials here.

BRAZILIAN REBELS CAPTURE 2 TOWNS URUGUAY BORDER

MONTEVIDEO, March 29.—All advice from the Brazilian frontier agree as to the gravity of the situation in the state of Rio Grande do Sul and the great extent attained by the revolutionary movement.

The capture of Rosario cause great alarm in Santa Anna do Livramento and in Quaraby. The inhabitants of both these places fled, taking refuge in Ataques, a Uruguayan town just over the border.

An uprising also is reported in Viamao, about ten miles from Porto Alegre. The rebels are said to have taken possession of the railroad.

Banditry has assumed large proportions in the southern part of the state.

BUENOS AIRES, Mar. 29.—A Montevideo dispatch to La Nacion says that advice from the frontier town of Rivera report the capture of Alegrete by Brazilian revolutionaries. The town was fortified and the government forces, although in possession of

several machine guns, retreated without a fight. Many of their regiments are said to have gone over to the revolutionaries.

WASHINGTON, March 29.—The state department has taken steps, it was officially announced late today, to convey to the soviet government, through the American ambassador at Berlin, the "earnest hope" that the lives of Archbishop Zepiak and Monsignor Butchkevitch of the Catholic church, under sentence to be executed tomorrow in Moscow, "may be spared."

ATLANTA, Ga., March 29.—Introduction by the government of a mass of documentary evidence marked today's session of the trial in federal court here of Victory E. Innes, charged with using the mails to defraud Mrs. Eloise Neime Dennis, who with her sister, Beatrice Neime, disappeared mysteriously ten years ago. The evidence presented by the prosecution included letters, photographs and written messages.

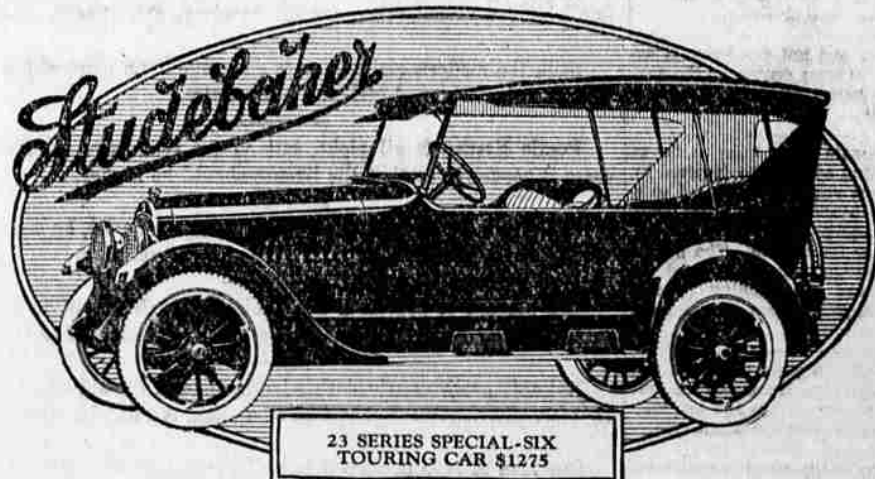
