

MACHINERY HERE ON SHALE PROJECT

Two carloads of machinery for the Hartman Syndicate of the Pacific Coast arrived in Ashland yesterday and according to W. A. Pettigrew, chief engineer, the work of establishing a camp, to be occupied by 75 men will be started at once on the property of the syndicate in the Antelope district.

A steam shovel, a 75 h. p. Case tractor, a light tractor, a saw mill, general camp equipment, a five ton Mack truck and two Symons crushers are included in the apparatus received.

The Hartman Syndicate, in which a number of Southern Oregon people are interested, is a stock company, organized for the reduction of and the securing of petroleum from the oil shale in the Antelope district near Ashland.

In the reduction of the shale, gas which is combustible and suitable for industrial and domestic use, is generated. This by-product, according to Pettigrew, will be marketed locally and plans call for future distribution of it at points as far distant as Salem and Portland.

The Hartman resort, which has been shipped from the east, is expected to arrive within the next three weeks. Following its installation several others will be installed.

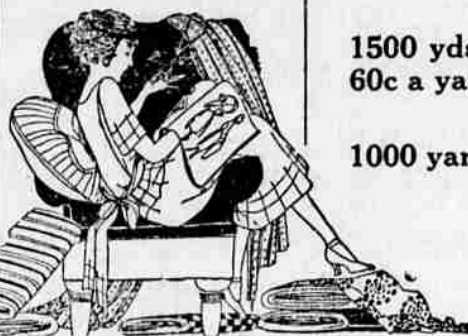
