

## BELOVED WOMAN OF LONG RESIDENCE HERE CALLED HOME

The funeral of Mrs. Margaret A. Weaver who died of pneumonia, March 28th, was held from the residence on West Main street, Friday afternoon at 2:30. Mrs. Weaver had been a resident of Medford for 23 years and her husband, who died in 1905 was prominent in civic activities until his death. Both Mr. and Mrs. Weaver were of noble ancestry. Mrs. Weaver being a direct descendant of Lord Baltimore, and Mr. Weaver of George Washington.

The funeral service was conducted by Rev. J. Randolph Sennett, who paid a fitting tribute to Mrs. Weaver. She was loved by many and honored by all who knew her. She had been an active member of the Methodist Episcopal church since youth.

Although her death was preceded by only a few days illness, all her eight children were at her bedside when she passed away, some coming from considerable distances. Eight children survive her, as follows: W. E. Weaver of Medford, J. M. Weaver of Shasta, Calif., Mrs. W. A. Fring of Washington, Penn., Mrs. Chas. Walcott of Sacramento, Calif., Mrs. W. H. Grable of Wheeling, West Va., Mrs. D. E. Phipps of Medford, Mrs. Homer H. Harvey of Medford and Mrs. Scott Davis also of this city.

Interment was in the I. O. O. F. cemetery by the side of her husband. The floral tributes evidenced the esteem in which Mrs. Weaver was held by her loved ones and friends.

## C. OF C. MAY RUN RADIO STATION

The directors of the Medford chamber of commerce met yesterday afternoon for the purpose of considering the help which the community could give to maintain the local broadcasting station. The total expense of the station has been paid for by W. J. Virginia but it has cost him more than what he can afford to spend, therefore he has indicated his intention to close the station unless outside assistance is rendered.

The directors agreed that the broadcasting station keeps Medford's name before a good many radio fans and that it is a means of advertising the community; however, they are not agreed on what support the chamber should give to maintain it and therefore have asked for a statement of expenditures made in the past so that something definite may be available for them to base their decision upon when the question comes up for final decision. The present board will take no action in the matter, so that this will be one of the first propositions for the new board to decide.

## INDIANS DESIRE VOICE IN LEASES OF OWN FARMS

**YAKIMA, Wash., March 31.**—The Indian commercial club, through its secretary, Neely Olney, yesterday at Yakima held a council and drafted a letter of protest to be sent to Hubert Work, secretary of the interior. The letter is in a way a reply to resolutions adopted last Wednesday at a mass meeting under the American Legion and asks that the "heart rule as well as the head" be in regard to the leasing of reservation lands to the Japanese. The Indians assert that the white men have argued about the Japanese on the reservation without paying attention to the wishes of the Indians, who should be first considered, as the land is his and the government has guaranteed him possession of it. The Indians say they favor restricted immigration, but would not have the Japanese immediately banned from the tribal lands.

## WESTERN UNION TO GIVE FRANCE AID

The local employees of the Western Union Telegraph company are now in full stride putting over the Good-Will campaign of the American Committee for Devastated France.

The Western Union is one of 62 large corporations in the United States who have voluntarily taken it upon their shoulders to help this worthy cause. The American committee has been in existence five years. It was formed to aid our ally, France, in rebuilding the portion of her territory that was laid waste by the war and to aid the wounded and care for the orphans.

The plan followed by the employees of the Western Union is to sell votes at 10 cents each for a delegate, a Western Union employee, who if elected will, with the delegates of the other corporations, go to France to study the situation as it exists. This delegation will then return to the United States and be able to carry on the work of the American committee.

The expenses of the various delegates are not paid out of the funds solicited—every dime given will be used for the rebuilding of France—or charitable purposes.

The campaign closes April 6th, or in one week, and Manager Osborne, of the local Western Union office, hopes the generous good people of Medford will respond to this call to the best of their ability.

Owing to the shortness of time it will be impossible for solicitors to see but a few—and it is hoped those who desire to help this worthy cause will call at the local Western Union office or telephone and ask that a messenger be sent for the donation.

## BALLAST CONTRACT FOR SOUTHERN PAC.

The Ancient River Mining company, which operates a large placer property on Rogue River has contracted to furnish crushed rock ballast for the Southern Pacific railroad. The project has been financed and the placer is now in operation. According to report general manager Boykin is now able to furnish more crushed rock than the railroad company can spare cars to handle.

The contract is said, calls for the delivery of 250,000 cubic yards of crushed rock and the work of furnishing the rock promises to provide another permanent payroll in the vicinity of Medford. The gold being extracted is said to run between 20 and 25 cents per cubic yard.

## NOTED CALIFORNIA CLIMATE DEFUNCT FOR EASTER HATS

**LOS ANGELES, March 31.**—Slightly overcast skies this morning and apprehensions of unsatisfactory Easter morning weather in southern California, preparations, went ahead, however, for outdoor sunrise services to be held at scores of scenic points of the southland. Thousands of visitors flocked to Riverside for the services on Mount Rubidoux, where the outdoor ceremony custom was originated.

Other places where large crowds were expected, included Mount Lowe, Hollywood, Eagle Rock, Santa Monica, Redondo Beach, Glendale and Catalina island.

**SAN FRANCISCO, March 31.**—Although California is not expected to celebrate Easter under smiling skies, there was no let up today in preparations for three big outdoor Easter observances in this city.

**SEATTLE, March 31.**—Despite a forecast of rain, preparations were going forward here today for outdoor observance of Easter tomorrow in city parks. Five thousand colored eggs will be provided for an egg rolling contest to be held at Volunteer park and band concerts with appropriate Easter music will be held at other parks of the city.

## LOCAL BUTTERFAT PRICES RAISED

Beginning April first the new schedule of prices for butterfat will go into effect. Dairymen of Jackson county will hereafter receive the same price for their butterfat as is quoted in the Portland market which is considerably more than what they have received in the past.

The above is the result of numerous conferences of representatives of the Medford and Ashland chambers of commerce, the Jackson County Farm Bureau, the Dairymen's Association and the creamerymen of Ashland and Medford.

mystery today was received differently in various quarters.

"Bunk," pronounced Chief William J. Burns of the bureau of investigation of the department of justice when the report was shown to him at Miami, Fla.

"Interesting if true," commented officials of the Burns detective

agency here, when they were informed. They predicted that if Wilson reveals "any names, we shall be able to make interesting disclosures."

The Los Angeles Times said today that Wilson declared he recognized the photographs of a man arrested in Warsaw as that of Max Wolfe, an individual as the same name to whom he sold the bomb.

There was a man arrested in Warsaw, charged with setting off the bomb, but according to Allen O. Meyers, the agent who made the arrest, he was never known as Max Wolfe. The man Meyers trailed was Wolfe Lindenfeld, alias William Lind.

Mr. Meyers said that agents are constantly watching both Lindenfeld and Wolfe.

**MIAMI, Fla., March 31.**—William Burns, chief of the United States investigation bureau in the justice de-

partment last night said five minutes in conversation with Herbert Wilson would determine the truth. He said he did not expect to arrive in Los Angeles earlier than ten days hence and denied that he was on his way there in connection with the Wall street bombing affair. He said he was touring the country in the interest of inspecting the various branches of his government department.

**NEW YORK, A March 31.**—New York police officials expressed their belief that the bomb "confession" made by Wilson was a ruse to stay the execution of his sentence for murder. They requested the Los Angeles authorities, however, to forward Wilson's Bertillon record and details of his story so that they might check with information on file here.
