

INDIAN RELICS OF A THOUSAND YEARS AGO DISCOVERED

ELK SPRINGS, Mo., March (By the Associated Press).—Shelters beneath overhanging limestone bluffs along the White and Cowskin rivers in the Ozarks of Missouri and Arkansas are today giving up to science the relics of a prehistoric race that inhabited this section upwards of a thousand years ago. The work of excavation is being done near here by an expedition from the Museum of the American Indian, Heye Foundation.

Buried deep in the dry dust of centuries beneath these formations of shelving rock where the ancients made their homes, these relics are being unearthed with no little difficulty. A cloud of powdery dust arises as the workers search the deposits for traces of civilization that is still unidentified. Use of masks often is necessary. For the present, the ancient people of the region are being referred to by Mr. R. Harrington, in charge of the expedition, as the Ozark bluff dwellers. They have not been identified as the ancestors of any modern Indian tribe.

In some of the rock shelters, particularly on the Cowskin or Elk river, the expedition has found near the surface, traces of a different and more modern, but still pre-colonial Indian race. These Indians, according to Mr. Harrington, probably were the Osages or some related tribe. It is estimated that even these specimens are at least three or four hundred years old. Those left by the spear-throwing bluff dwellers of the Ozarks, which also have been uncovered, are probably upwards of a thousand years old.

Everything so far found is purely aboriginal. Mr. Harrington explained, not the slightest trace of the white man's handiwork or influence having been discovered. The specimens include baskets, woven textiles, wooden articles, implements of stone and bone and even pieces of pottery. Some of the articles no doubt were buried by the ancient dwellers for safe keeping, it is believed by the excavators, while others simply were out and were discarded or lost in the ashes and trash of generations that has accumulated beneath the bluffs. At some places the deposits have been so well protected by the overhanging rock formation that they are absolutely dry, which has resulted in remarkable preservation.

It was a visit by Mr. Harrington to the home in Seneca, Mo., of Dr. W. C. Barnard, who had one of the largest private collections of Indian relics in existence at that time, that resulted in the present expedition. That was in the fall of 1914.

AL C. SMITH EXPLAINS PROHIBITION STAND

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 3.—Native nuts, crops and naval power lines were the principal sufferers from the typhoon that struck the island of Guam March 25, according to later advices received today by the naval communication authorities here. No loss of life was mentioned nor was any estimate or damage given.

FINISH ROOSEVELT HIGHWAY IN 1924

DULUTH, Minn., March.—The last link in the 4,000 miles of highway connecting Portland, Me., and Portland, Ore., a permanent living memorial to Theodore Roosevelt, whose name it bears, is expected to be completed when its fifth year of construction has passed, next February.

One-fifth of the stretch remains to be worked. Approximately \$21,000,000 has been spent since the highway was designated according to A. W. Tracy of Duluth, executive secretary, more than \$6,000,000 of which was allotted last year. The money has come from county, state and national road funds.

The highway now is virtually all marked in the thirteen northern states through which it passes and has been improved to 82.9 per cent, either gravelled or hard surfaced. The association has co-operated but not competed, with every legitimate highway and good roads organization during its construction, and has been endorsed by civic organizations along the route.

The association was organized February 17, 1919, as a memorial to Theodore Roosevelt, to provide a northern trans-continental highway.

LENINE DYING AGAIN REPORT

LONDON, April 3.—Premier Lenine is dying, says a dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph company from Stockholm today, quoting the Helsingfors correspondent of the Svenska Dagbladet, telegraphing that the soviet legation in Helsingfors has received a message from Moscow to that effect.

The paralysis in his right arm is spreading, according to the dispatch. After his death, the quoted message adds, a military dictatorship will be established, headed by Minister of War Trotsky, with four or five associates.

The Moscow official bulletin of March 29 said Premier Lenine's condition was unchanged except for a slight improvement in temperature.

TO NAME ORATOR FOR AGENDA 9

SANTIAGO, April 3.—(By the Associated Press).—The political committee of the Pan-American conference has not yet chosen the "expounding secretary," who will handle topic nine of the agenda, dealing with plans for a closer association with the American nations and topic 16, which considers questions arising from possible aggression by a non-American. This is taken as an indication of the delicacy with which the congress is approaching the subject matter of these two topics.

It is believed that Uruguay's withdrawal of her scheme for an association of nations is not likely to be followed by any other plan under this head and that a suggestion for placing the organization of the Pan-American union on the basis of an international alliance likely to be the nearest approach to a closer association which will be discussed.

GRAIN CONCERNS PLAN MERGER

KANSAS CITY Mo., April 3.—Officers of the United States Grain Growers, Inc., and the American Wheat Growers, Inc., were conferring here today on plans to amalgamate the two grain marketing agencies. The United States Grain Growers is the marketing firm of the American Farm Bureau Federation and the American Wheat Growers associated was formulated this week at Wichita as an overhead agency for the various state wheat pools.

The conference here is expected to work out plans by which the American Wheat Growers, Associated, Inc., will handle wheat on a co-operative pooling basis without competition.

WIVES GET FIRST CRACK AT PAY

NEW ORLEANS, April 3.—Married men employed by the city government were thrown into consternation today with the announcement by Commissioner Murphy that hereafter their pay checks would be mailed to their home address instead of being handed to them in person.

"Every city employee from the mayor down is going to get his check at home," Commissioner Murphy said. "Every member of the commission is in the same fix as the street laborer on this move. The money belongs in the home and I am going to do my best to put it there and then, if some of the wives cannot keep it there, that is their fault."

40 HIGH SCHOOLS TO COMPETE FOR BASKETBALL TITLE

CHICAGO, April 3.—(By Associated Press). Schoolboy basketball stars from thirty states are here today to compete in the national invitation interscholastic basketball tournament which opens at the University of Chicago tomorrow, continuing until Saturday night. Forty teams, most of them state champions, will fight for the national title now held by the Blue Devils of Lexington, Ky.

Defeat will mean elimination and the loser of the opening game between Walla Walla, Wash., and Gloversville, N. Y., tomorrow, will face a wasted journey of at least a thousand miles.

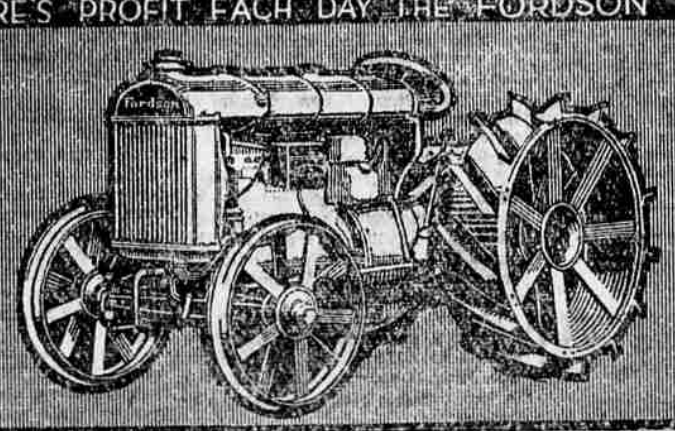
