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CARKIN NAMED AS CITY ATTORNEY BY CITY COUNCIL

The city council disposed of a large riot of business last night including the passing of a number of segregation property ordinances, taking steps to bring the management of the Jacksonville railroad to time, receiving the resignation of City Attorney F. W. Mears and approving the appointment of John H. Carkin to that office, and the approving of the usual monthly bills, besides passing the resolution looking to building a subway on Sixth street, as related elsewhere in this paper.

The mayor and councilmen angered by the long delay of the management of the Jacksonville railroad in repairing its street crossings in the city have been goaded into action at last, hence unanimously decided last night to notify that management that unless they had this work under way and would give substantial guarantee that it would be carried on to completion, by the next council meeting, April 17, the railroad's franchise would be rescinded and its tracks torn up.

The resignation of Mr. Mears and the appointment of his successor by Mayor Gaddis of John Carkin, it had been known would take place ever since the new administration assumed office in January, and hence created no surprise. However the council asked Mr. Mears to remain in office for a week or ten days yet to clean up some pending city cases in the courts and other matters, as Mr. Carkin has his hands full with delinquent property matters and in addition is revising the city ordinances for ten years a back and drawing up the new zoning ordinance for the city planning commission. The work in the city attorney's office has so been bunched up for some time past that it has kept two men busy.

As soon as his part of the work is completed Mr. Mears will remove to

Los Angeles, to which city his wife and son left several weeks ago. Mr. Carkin has been the special attorney for several years past for the city in looking after important tax work and taking over and disposing of properties for delinquent taxes. As soon as the present rush is cleared up, in his capacity as city attorney, he will look after the duties of both offices.

In dilating on the necessity at the council meeting last night of the city retaining the services of Mr. Mears for two weeks longer Mr. Carkin paid a high tribute to the retiring city attorney by stating that in his work of looking over the ordinances for a period of ten years past he had found the ordinances for the past six years in such fine condition in phraseology and legality that they needed no change or revision. Mr. Mears had held the office of city attorney for the past six years and three months.
