

MISSING PRIEST IS 'CAPTURED' FROM JAILERS, REPORT

NEW YORK, April 5.—(By the Associated Press)—A telegram from Buffalo signed "J. I. Perrine" was received today at Knights of Columbus headquarters here stating that Rev. J. A. Vranjak of Virden, Ill., reported kidnapped in Venice, Ill., on March 5 had been "captured from his abductors" and was being returned to his home today.

The telegram which gave Perrine's address only as "the square" was addressed to John B. Kennedy, editor of Columbia, a magazine published by the Knights of Columbus.

Mr. Kennedy expressed belief that the telegram was not a hoax.

VIRDEN, Ill., April 5.—(By the Associated Press)—The family of the missing priest, said today, had been "captured from his abductors" as stated in a New York dispatch. Frank Vranjak, brother of the missing priest, said this afternoon.

"We are just as much in the dark about the whereabouts of my brother as we were the day he disappeared," Frank Vranjak said.

GERMANS TRY TO IMITATE IRISH

BERLIN, April 5.—(By the Associated Press)—The French, it is stated in advices from Welsbaden are deporting from the occupied area a large number of former German army officers. The advices named a retired general, a lieutenant general, a lieutenant colonel and a major who were routed out of bed early in the morning and taken across the border. None of the deportees, it appears was of any considerable prominence.

Reports from Muenster say the eastern edge of the Ruhr is the scene at present of considerable movement of troops both from and toward France.

French cavalry reports add has occupied Rudendorf and Glimborn (24 miles northeast of Cologne). Three additional mines—at Buer, Recklinhausen and Waltpo, have been occupied. (A Duesseldorf dispatch Tuesday night announced the occupation by the French of the additional mines owned by the state, the Koenigs, Ludwig and Bergmanns in the Recklinhausen district, making six state mines controlled by the French in addition to the same number of private mines).

TURKS GET MORE TIME TO DRINK

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 5.—(By Associated Press). Constantinople has three more days in which to quench its thirst for the local authorities have postponed the prohibition decree.

Meanwhile the streets are blocked with porters, cabs, carriages and automobiles laden with liquor which is offered at top prices. The period within which alcoholic beverages may be exported has been extended for two months.

Rome to Protest
ROME, April 5.—(By Associated Press). Pope Pius and Cardinal Gasparri, the papal secretary of state are discussing the advisability of formally protesting before the world against the execution of Monsignor Butchkevitch, vicar general of the Roman Catholic church in Russia.

13 PER CENT OF LUMBER CUT IS NEEDLESSLY LOST

WASHINGTON, April 4.—Thirteen per cent of the lumber cut annually is wasted, W. B. Greeley, the government's chief forester, said today in continuing his testimony before the special senate reforestation committee. He presented many illustrations showing the possibility of economies in sawmill work, showing that most of the waste resulted from failure of mills to prepare their product in dimensions available for the most economical use of the industries requiring it.

Federal reforestation legislation should be confined for some years to the extension of fire protection, Mr. Greeley said, but he would have the government by legislation or through its good offices try to influence the states in adopting a taxation system which would encourage owners to put their cutover and non-agricultural lands into new forests.

For ten years at least, under present conditions, the federal government should not undertake to exercise control over forests upon privately owned lands, he said. When private land owners feel more assured of a friendly and helpful state and federal policy however, he added, results could be obtained through federal control which eventually might be extended beyond reforestation and include the supervision of lumbering, which would be constitutional.

RABBI'S ATTACKER STILL AT LARGE

SAN FRANCISCO, April 5.—While Rabbi Alfred J. Lafee of Bush street temple here lay at the point of death in a hospital today as the result of an attack yesterday by an unknown man in the uniform of a sailor in the navy, the police were trying to penetrate the mystery in the reported fact that the rabbi and his assailant registered together at a hotel Tuesday night, the rabbi under the name of A. Layne.

Rabbi Lafee, 22 years old, is one of the youngest rabbis in the United States. His charge is a large downtown synagogue. He is known nationally in Jewish circles.

Surgeons today held little hope for recovery, though they said he had "a fighting chance." Efforts of the police to find the man garbed as a sailor were fruitless.

ENLARGE SCOPE OF PAN-AMERICA

SANTIAGO, Chile, April 4.—(By the Associated Press)—Enlargement of the scope of the Pan-American union to permit the performance of any function conferred on it by the governing board or by subsequent Pan-American conferences is proposed in a convention which Dr. L. S. Brown of the United States delegation submits today to the political committee of the present congress.

The union already has authority over commercial and educational problems, but the fact that it is not empowered to consider such questions as armament leads to the suggestion that its organization be amended to give it supervision over such topics.

DOPE PEDDLER IS GIVEN A JOLT

TACOMA, April 4.—Jack Dillon, the first of the nineteen persons arrested here in an extensive roundup of alleged narcotic peddlers to go on trial smiled in happiness today when Judge Askren dismissed his case for lack of evidence. The smile was dissipated a moment later when federal officers arrested Dillon under the Harrison act. Dillon was recently released after serving a year and a day at the federal prison at McNeil island for violating the Harrison act.

After the Dillon case was dismissed, Judge Askren dismissed the case of John McWhirter, another defendant under the new anti-narcotic law. McWhirter refused legal assistance and announced he would serve as his own attorney.

WIDOW GIVES UP RICHES FOR LOVE

LONDON, April 5.—(By Associated Press). The newspapers assert that Lady Northcliffe by marrying Sir Robert Arundell Hudson, relinquishes a large fortune. There are no estimates of the amount.

It is recalled that under the terms of the publisher's will, his widow was given an annuity of 25 per cent of the residuary trust "during her widowhood." Similarly Lord Northcliffe's London residence, Carlton Gardens, was bequeathed to her for the same period.

SOCIAL AGENCIES IN PUBLIC SCHOOL ADDRESS SUBJECT

SPOKANE, Wash., April 5.—The mission of the American schools today is a social one and the hope of the future lies in the organization of the social agencies to work together with the schools in developing the youth, declared Dr. Charles A. Prosser, former federal vocational director, addressing the Inland Empire Teachers' convention today.

Speaking on "the social adjustment of youth to life," the professor said: "Ordinarily people think of the Anglo-Saxon apprenticeship system purely as a device for the training of new recruits in trade practices. In reality it is the most effective scheme for the preparation of youth for the big social life the world has ever known. The young apprentice learned not only the art and mastery of his craft, but living in the home of the craftsman, he obtained all the education he ever received. He was trained in cleanliness, manners, polite speech, morals, religion and good citizenship."

"This scheme of training functioned for the establishment of good conduct and habits as well as the development of ideas. There is no scheme of training in existence in the world today that is so certain and sure of results as this."

"This Anglo-Saxon civilization, unlike any other is built upon the idea of developing every citizen to play his part in democracy. Autocracy works from without; the Anglo-Saxon democracy from within. Consequently the hope of democracy lies in the development of all its people."

Dr. Prosser also declared that other social agencies had a part to play in the training of American citizens.

"One of the tasks that remain is to organize society so that it may cooperate with the schools and secure mental discipline, vocational adjustment and a sense of thrift and thus train the youth in the adequate performance of his social duties," he said.

COAST KLANSMEN END KONKLAVE

WALLA WALLA, Wash., April 4.—Most of the out-of-town delegates to the Ku Klux Klan district meeting held here Monday and Tuesday returned home last night, having ended their semi-annual convocation. No meeting was held at the convention hall today, but it was said that the local Klan's naturalization ceremony would be held "at the usual place" tonight and a few visitors remained over for the event.

BETHROTHAL MISS COULD PUBLIC

NEW YORK, April 5.—The betrothal of Miss Gloria Gould, 17, youngest daughter of George J. Gould, to Henry A. Bishop, Jr., a Yale student, son of Henry A. Bishop of Bridgeport, Conn., will be announced tonight, the New York Herald says today. Her father has been critically ill with pneumonia at Montone, France, for several weeks.

HARTFORD, Conn.—An anti-daylight saving bill which would impose a fine of \$100 or ten days' imprisonment for "malicious violations" was passed by the lower house of the legislature today.

CHIEF WITNESS AT KLAMATH FAILURE TRIAL RESENTFUL

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., April 4.—Marshall Hooper, vice president and director of the defunct First State and Savings bank was the chief witness today at the trial of John W. Siemens and John Siemens, Jr., on charges of misapplying funds of the bank.

Hooper clashed with the state's attorney during direct examination. Asked if it were not true that he testified before the grand jury that he had often protested to Siemens on loans and overdrafts favoring the Klamath Livestock Mortgage Loan company, a Siemens corporation, Hooper denied that his testimony before the grand jury conveyed that meaning.

The defense objected to the prosecution's attempt to impeach its own witness. The court overruled the objection.

Hooper denied that he had used assets of the Savings department of the bank as collateral for a loan of \$50,000 made by the Ladd and Tilton bank of Portland to the First State and Savings bank.

Hooper is under indictment on a misdemeanor charge in connection with the bank failure.

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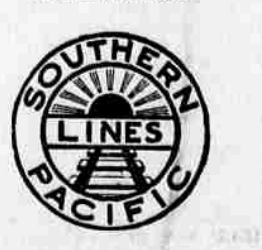
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
