

JAP DOCTOR FINDS SERUM FOR CURE OF SPOTTED FEVER

MISSOULA, Mont., April 5.—Something new in immunity work in spotted fever was promised this morning by Dr. Hideyo Noguchi, noted Japanese scientist, when he reached Missoula to attend the northwest conference on Rocky Mountain tick control, in session here today.

Noguchi refused to discuss what he had discovered in recent experiments, but will disclose the results in an address to the conference tonight. Noguchi last fall discovered a serum for the cure of spotted fever in cases where the disease had not advanced to its final stages.

"I have come all the way from New York to tell you," he told Dr. W. F. Gogswell, secretary of the Montana health board.

The session this morning consisted largely of reports from health authorities of the northwest states.

Dr. Gogswell in the opening address said the object of the meeting was to get the western states together to discuss a common problem. Speakers from neighboring states responded, each telling conditions as presented in his own field.

BLAME REFINERS FOR PRICES

WASHINGTON, April 5.—Present prices of sugar were laid wholly at the door of the refiners today by Acting Chairman Smoot of the senate finance committee, who issued a statement declaring the refining interests hoped to get a tariff low enough to destroy the American producing industry and bring the control of every pound of the commodity into their hands.

Senator Smoot said he hoped for an early investigation of sugar prices and suggested that the tariff committee call as its first witness Senator Simmons of North Carolina, who is ranking democrat on the committee and who has blamed the tariff for the present situation.

20 YR. TERM GIVEN SPOKANE FORGER

SPOKANE, April 5.—C. D. Gillette, alias Clyde B. Gamble, arrested recently in San Francisco, entered a plea of guilty to a charge of first degree forgery in superior court here today and was sentenced to a term of 1 to 20 years in the state reformatory at Monroe. He admitted having forged two checks for \$600 on the Third National bank of Walla Walla and said he had forged numerous others, including two in Colfax and four in Walla Walla for lesser amounts.

STELLA APPEALS TO CLEAR NAME

NEW YORK, April 5.—Supreme Court Justice O'Malley today granted the application of Miss Stella Larrimore for a stay of all proceedings in Geraldine Farrar's divorce proceedings against her actor husband, Lou Tellegen, until April 20. The stay was sought so that Miss Larrimore, named as co-respondent, might appeal from a decision denying her demand for a jury trial to determine the truth of the charges against her.

VICKSBURG, Miss., April 5.—Babe Ruth went seven miles into the country here yesterday to see a small boy who during a long illness had been asking in his prayers each night that he be made well enough to see Ruth when the New York club came to Vicksburg. Ruth spent an hour with the little fellow.

ESSEN.—Two more German workmen wounded in the clash with French troops at the Krupp plant last Saturday died, bringing the total fatalities to thirteen.

INTRODUCE BOOKS AND RECORDS IN K. F. BANK TRIAL

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., April 5.—Today's morning session of the trial of John W. Siemens and his son on charges of misapplication of funds of the First State and Savings bank was occupied with introduction of books and records, and identification of them by former employees of the defunct bank.

The defense objected to the introduction of the bank ledger, but the court overruled the objection with the remark that the defendants should have nothing to fear from their own books.

Garrett Van Riper, former teller, testified that when Marshall Hooper, former vice president of the bank, made a trip to Portland in December, 1921, to obtain a \$50,000 loan from the Ladd and Tilton bank, Van Riper was in charge of the savings department. Van Riper said he was ordered to take good warrants from the savings department and put them in the commercial department, whence they were taken by Hooper to use as collateral for the Portland loan. These warrants, said Van Riper, were replaced by other papers from the commercial department. The court would not permit the witness to express an opinion as to the relative value of the papers exchanged.

H. S. Nowell, San Francisco accountant, was here today as the state's chief witness and was expected to take the stand late today.

LONDON, April 5.—Gwendolyn Marshall Field, grand daughter of the late Marshall Field of Chicago, was married this afternoon to Archibald Charles Edmonstone, heir of Sir Archibald Edmonstone. The ceremony in the Church of St. Martin-in-the-Fields, was followed by a reception at Mall House, the home of the bride's aunt, Countess Beatty.

Marshall Field, the bride's brother, was unable to attend the wedding because he was stricken with chickenpox Tuesday. In his absence the bride was given in marriage by Admiral Earl Beatty.

White House President Harding plans to return to the scenes of his early childhood to become a gentleman farmer and spend much of his time writing.

This was announced here today by the president's close home town friends, following his purchase yesterday of the farm in North Bloomfield township, Morrow county, where he was born. The purchase consists of 265½ acres and was made by French Crow, Marion postmaster and intimate friend of the president.

The original Harding farm where the president was born consists of 155 acres and is far away from any railroad. It is about a twenty mile drive from Marion. The land is described as rolling, with corn the principal crop. The house in which the executive was born is still standing, altho in a bad state of decay. It is used as a storage space for farm machinery.

President Harding has told close friends that he expects to visit the farm in July and possibly sooner, to plan improvements. Friends say he plans a modern bungalow and a golf course.
