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HURRAH, SETTLE R. R. FISH ISSUE AND NOBODY MAD

For the first time in the history of Rogue River fishing an amicable adjustment of differences which have been built up by the mistaken prejudices of Josephine and Jackson county sportsmen has been accomplished without loss of temper.

Hostilities were opened by a gathering together of representative men of Gold Hill, Jackson county, in the person of Martin Bowers and M. S. Johnson, two of the premier sportsmen of the northern end of the county, who are widely known throughout the state, Mr. Wilford Allen, president of the Josephine county irrigation system, who resides at Grants Pass, whose dam across Rogue river at Savage rapids has been the seat of contention, Messrs. William R. Coleman and Pat Dally, local district game and fish wardens, and the following members of the Crater Lake Rod and Gun club of Jackson county: F. R. Davis, president; Sidney S. Smith, Frank S. Miller, "Chick" Hawk and "Buckshot" Simmons, Harris Janes, as well as Claud Bardon, a commercial fisherman of Grants Pass. It is to be regretted that the time limit in negotiating the meeting did not permit of notice being gotten to Ashland in time to secure representation from that city, though the interests of Ashland are identical with Medford in this instance.

The gathering was in no sense an official visit, but was merely called together for the purpose of securing a definite understanding of whatever differences each party might advance and a possible solution of the real in the dissipation of the imaginary grievances.

Since the erection of obstructions in the river during times past, the retarding of the passage of fish through the fishways as provided by the various commercial interests in conjunction with the game commission, has been a bitter and long-drawn out struggle each interest contending for some real or fancied right infringed upon by the others.

Since the removal of the "Golden Ditch" dam three miles above Grants Pass the greatest source of trouble has emanated from conditions at the new "Savage Rapids" dam erected by the Grants Pass irrigation district at an expense of \$800,000, with a fishway on the north side of the dam only. The fishway is now conceded by the Medford and Ashland fishermen to be a very efficient one with the exception of such times as the changing conditions with respect to irrigation operations congest the fish in the river for periods of two or three days.

The clamor has arisen each spring from Medford and Ashland to the effect that the adjustment of the opening of the gates in the dam has been so purposely contrived as to preclude the passage of the fish through the ladder in this way. By the opening of the gates in the dam about two-thirds of the distance across the river from the fish ladder, there was a deep eddy formed of "dead" water at the location of the mouth of the fish ladder through fish would not travel to hunt up the entrance of the ladder but would persistently fight the turbulent current in a vain effort to climb a twenty-five foot dam and the consequent mangling of the fish upon the rocks over which the water tumbled from the dam forcing those fish not so mangled to drop farther down the river in the eddies until such time as they could resuscitate for another fruitless dash over, an insurmountable obstruction. Herein lies the suspicions of the fishermen as to the fairness of the operators of the irrigation system. The county line between Jackson and Josephine counties runs diagonally through the dam. The directors of the irrigation system are Josephine county men. The offended fishermen are Jackson county sportsmen who are not commercial fishermen. Through the holding of the fish below the dam Josephine county fishermen have the fish within six miles of their doors as against twenty-six for Medford fishermen and thirty-eight for Ashland; the fish would be prevented from passing up the river for spawning purposes as well; the tired and injured salmon are easy prey for poachers who illegally take the fish with gaff hooks and nets during the midnight hours and peddle them commercially through channels difficult for the officers to detect.

Upon the arrival of the party at the dam Mr. Wilford Allen very courteously explained the workings of the dam to the assembled men and listened attentively to the stating of the views of the Jackson county delegation as to the relative adjustment of the gates with respect to the directing of the current through the stream with the object of the elimination of the "dead" water eddy at the mouth or intake of the fish ladder and the prevention of the fish congregating in a dead pocket formed by the current within easy reach of poachers from the shore line directly below the dam and next to the Pacific Highway. At first glance this seemed to the sportsmen to be a matter which could be easily accomplished by the gate tenders if they were inclined to be fair rather than hostile. Though Mr. Allen assured the party that the arrangement of the gates as then in operation was the best that could be devised and was a result of two years of constant study and attention and could best be attested to be such by reason of the scarcity of fish below the dam, yet the gate tenders were directed by Mr. Allen to lower the gates to suit the ideas of the group, which required a matter of some two hours and danger of accident to the dam, thus demonstrating that the plan of operation by the irrigation district is as nearly perfect as could be devised and is satisfactory to the Jackson county sportsmen, and that the irrigation district and game commission were in good faith endeavoring to meet a bad situation to the best of their ability. Being "mad" in the sense that any obstruction in a stream is bad. The irrigation district and the

game commission will henceforth find the sportsmen of Jackson county helping rather than hindering them and loud praise is now being expressed toward Mr. Allen and his courteous endeavor to assist a better understanding between sportsmen and irrigationists.

GARDENING WEEK NOW UNDER WAY

This week is gardening week in Oregon. Boys' and girls' garden clubs are being started throughout the country and a club of this nature will be organized tomorrow in Medford.

The meeting as announced in the schools for 8 o'clock has been changed to 9 o'clock instead. This will be held in the basement of the public library and all members interested in this work are requested to be there for the opening meeting. In order that the parents might know something of the project, 600 square feet of garden space might be used in the work and at least five of such vegetable raised as can be shown at the fair. Several very nice prizes were won in this garden project last year and for town members this project is one of the best we have.

In the same way a poultry club will be formed from the members from all schools held at 11 o'clock at the library. This project takes in the raising of baby chicks, ducks, turkeys and old hens. All school children interested should be present for organization tomorrow.

Aside from these clubs for Medford, a rabbit club will be formed, the meeting date of which will be announced later.
