

NEW OFFICERS OF ELKS INSTALLED AT BIG MEETING

Following the installation of their new officers and interesting smoker, the local lodge of Elks last night crabbled, hoddogged, nearbeered, cheese and coffee, then went home at midnight to dream of the great progress which all anticipate under the new local B. P. O. E. administration during the year. In fact some of the brethren dreamed of several future and past administrations, so simple and good was the feed.

Those Elks are a finicky lot, and hence changed from their several year's habit of having the baldheaded, tall skinny exalted type of rulers, to having one this year of the big plump, baywindowed wind, with lots of feathers on the roof.

The new officers installed, who were recently elected are as follows: Exalted ruler, Louis Ulrich; esteemed leading knight, J. W. Jacobs; esteemed loyal knight, Ben Moller; esteemed lecturing knight, Alex Sparrow; secretary, Leo Jacobs; treasurer, V. H. Vawter; tiler, Nick Young; trustee, A. C. 2 KILLED IN AUTO AT R. R. CROSSING

INDEPENDENCE, Ore., April 6.—Fred J. Featherstone, aged 40 and Joseph M. Jones, 50, farmers, were killed and Dave Quirring, 20, was seriously injured today when an automobile in which they were riding was struck by a Southern Pacific electric train at a crossing two miles south of Independence.

The automobile was demolished and two of the men were hurled more than 100 feet. The front part of the train was damaged. The men, employed on a construction job, were on their way to work when the accident occurred.

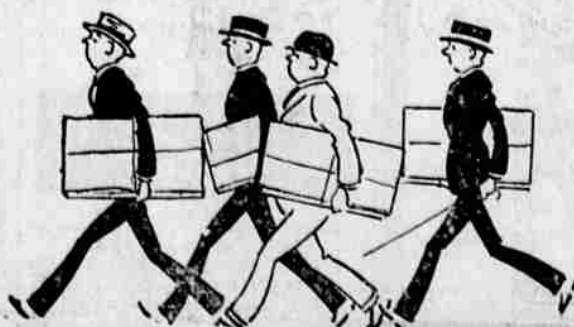
