

DOUBLE CAPACITY FAIR GROUND STAND BUILD HORSE TRACK

The directors of the Jackson County Fair association and the members of the county court met Friday and arrangements were made whereby the fair association will proceed to erect an addition 124 feet long to the present grandstand, which doubles the capacity of the present stand. This is absolutely necessary to provide proper facilities to comfortably take care of the people. This will be completed for use at the June 15 and 16 meet.

A horse track, either a half-mile or a mile, will also be built just as soon as work can commence so it will be settled and in fine shape for the fair Sept. 12 to 15 inclusive.

The fair association now belongs to the Northwest Fair Circuit and will get some of the best harness horses and gallopers that make the coast fairs.

It is the aim of the fair directors, assisted by the county court, to make this year's fair far superior in attractions and accommodations to last year's fair and one of the very best in the entire Pacific northwest. Better arrangements will be made for displays of swine, sheep, poultry, pet stock, etc.

County Court Will Add Two More Units To County Roads

The county court at their session Friday decided to build 1 1/2 miles more of the Butte Falls road, between the John Allen place and Frank Nell's. They will advertise for bids to be opened April 18 for this work.

They also decided to build a five mile unit on the Sam's valley road, between the post office and Table Rock store. These bonds were voted in 1920 but have not all been issued as yet. Bids will also be asked for this road.

ROYAL WEDDING IN ITALY MONDAY

ROME, April 7.—(By the Associated Press)—Seven hundred persons have received invitations to the wedding of Princess Yolanda to Count Carlo Calvi di Bergolo next Monday morning. The invitations have been limited only to the civil and military households of the king and queen, the queen mother and the royal princes, in addition to the first four categories in the precedence list of state officials. The latter include wearers of the collar of the Annunziata, with their wives and the presidents of the senate and chamber, members of the cabinet, judges of the supreme court, generals and admirals.

Presents are arriving from many parts of Italy, as well as from abroad. The cabinet has presented an elaborate gold dinner service, hand chased.

German Mayor Sentenced.
BERLIN, April 7.—A French court martial, sitting at Recklinhausen, has increased to three years the prison sentence imposed on Vice Lord Mayor Schaefer of Essen. His fine has been increased by six million marks.

Herr Schaefer was arrested in February on a charge of not supplying French troops with automobiles and coal.

FEDERAL PROBE OF DOUBLE ESCAPE

ATHENS, Ga., April 7.—Federal investigation of the circumstances surrounding the escape of Gerald Chapman, convicted mail bandit, from the hospital here, has begun. Agents of the United States department of justice, under the personal direction of William J. Burns, department head, arrived here today and immediately went into conference with hospital authorities and federal prison guards now on duty here.

The convict escaped from the federal prison at Atlanta more than a week ago. He was captured with three bullet wounds near here a few days later. From the hospital where he was taken for treatment, he gained his freedom for the second time by means of two sheets knotted together. Early yesterday, while the country was being combed for some trace of Chapman, he was discovered by a nurse in a lavatory room at the hospital, but made his escape.

MAN IN SAILOR BLUE SOUGHT

SAN FRANCISCO, April 7.—Naval authorities today joined in the search for a man garbed in a sailor's uniform who inflicted severe injuries upon Rabbi Alfred G. Lafee on Wednesday that he died yesterday.

Surgeons operated in an effort to save the rabbi's life, but he never regained consciousness fully.

Soon after the operation he was semi-conscious for a few seconds when he muttered the words: "Fight" and "Hit," which were interpreted to refer to his assailant.

The sailor and the rabbi occupied the same hotel room Tuesday night. The sailor left early Wednesday morning and later the rabbi was found wandering about the room in a dazed condition. Several motives have been advanced for the assault, among them robbery.

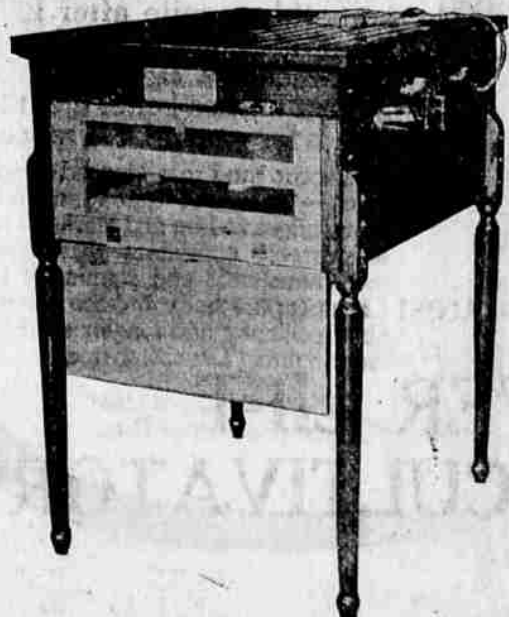
