

MEN WITH FACES SCRATCHED SOUGHT SLAYERS OF GIRLS

NEW YORK, April 7.—Men with scratched faces were being sought by police as the murderers of the two young women found hacked to death on an unfrequented road near the Staten Island shore yesterday. Police found evidence of a frantic struggle for life by the two women. Mrs. Irene Blandino of Jersey City and Mrs. Bessie McMahon of Utica, N. Y.

The theory that the blackhand may be involved in the murders was advanced after police learned that Mrs. Blandino's first husband, Frank Bongiorno, had been killed by a man who had lived with the woman before she met Bongiorno. That killing, the police think, was actuated by revenge.

While pursuing this theory the Jersey City police were holding as material witnesses Blandino and Rosario di Lorenzo, an employee in the former's barber shop, who had not satisfied the police with accounts of their movements the night of the murder.
