REVISE VIEW ON SURTAX CUTS

WASHINGTON, April 12.—The recent statement by Secretary Mellon concerning possible reduction of federal surtaxes should be interpreted to include all surtaxes and not the higher brackets alone, it was said today by high treasury officials. Mr. Mellon did not intend that his statement should be taken to apply alone to the higher surtaxes, it was emphasized, but agreed that if it were possible to reduce the schedules at all, there should be a scaling down all along the line. It was added that the secretary was in accord with President Harding that a careful analysis of detailed tax returns should be made before any definite steps toward revision are taken.

POLAND BUSY IN EXPELLING JEWS

WARSAW, April 12.—(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)—Hundreds of Jews are being arrested daily in accordance with the order of the Polish government expelling all Jewish refugees from Poland.

It is estimated that more than 8,000 refugees have been deported.

A demand that all Russian Jews in Poland be interned and held as hostages and that their property be confiscated until Archbishop Zepiak recently condemned to ten years imprisonment by a soviet court in Moscow, is released, was made at a huge meeting held at Bromberg in protest against the execution of Vicar General Butchkevitch.

News Summary of Last Night

HELSINGFORS—Parliament passed the bill for the funding of Finland's debt to the United States.

NEW YORK—Thomas F. Smith, former congressman and for many years secretary of Tammany Hall died an hour after being struck by a taxicab.

NEW YORK—Use of the radio to broadcast market information or forecasts of business by its members is prohibited by a resolution drawn by the New York Stock Exchange.

LONDON—The British government is giving due deliberation to methods to assist America in curbing rum running. Under Secretary Ronald McNeill told the house of commons.

PARIS—French experts said the German government is spending in actual cash abroad and her reduced income of foreign monies sufficient to have met the cash reparations under the Cannes agreement of 60,000,000 gold marks monthly.
