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NEITHER SIDE OF BRITISH SQUABBLE SOLACED BY PRESS

LONDON, April 12.—(By the Associated Press)—Neither the government nor the opposition is likely to derive much satisfaction from the commentaries on yesterday's scene in the house of commons printed in the newspapers today.

The Times, which gives general support to the government, rebukes it for not showing a more accommodating attitude towards the opposition, but equally condemns the latter's "violent temper."

The liberal newspapers charge the government with shiftiness and incapacity. The Chronicle says that an early general election may be looked for. The Westminster Gazette asserts that the government lost, if not the confidence, at least the unquestioning loyalty of its followers.

None of the newspapers, not even the Daily Herald, labor's organ, has anything to say in defense of the action of the laborite extremists which, according to universal testimony, was much to the distaste of J. Ramsay MacDonald, and the moderate leaders.

Mr. MacDonald is said to have been gravely annoyed at the injection of the "Red Flag" into the proceedings. Some observers say that when the song started, he turned around sharply and frowned, waving a hand deprecatingly to his followers seated behind him.

LONDON, April 12.—(By the Associated Press)—It was reported today that upon the reassembling of parliament this afternoon Prime Minister Bonar Law's harassed government would seek refuge in the appointment of a committee to examine the question of the salaries paid to war veterans of the service.

This step would be taken as a concession to the bitter opposition in the house of commons, it was the insistence of the laborites, supported by many members of other parties, for a definite statement from the government as to what it intended to do for the veterans, that formed the cloud from which developed the present storm.

Out of the overcast sky that brought the government a defeat Tuesday on a division there grew yesterday a hurricane, forcing a suspension of the sitting after wild scenes of disorders unprecedented for at least a generation in the staid old house of commons.

England gasped today when it read the press reports of the physical encounters and the singing of "The Red Flag" within the sacred walls.

NIGHT TRAFFIC IN BUER HALTED

BERLIN, April 12.—It is reported from Buer that that town has been fined 50,000,000 marks and that all street traffic at night is forbidden on account of the blowing up of the militarized railway between Buer and Recklinghausen.

ESSEN, April 12.—(By the Associated Press)—Fifty-one Germans "murdered" and 238,000 tons of coal and coke exported—this is the way the Germans summarize the outstanding results of the occupation of the Ruhr which began three months ago. They declare that the reparations deliveries of coal and coke under pre-occupation condition would have been 4,200,000 tons of coal and coke.

Semi-official quarters here has issued a list giving the names, addresses and occupations and dates of the deaths of Germans who have been killed.

Twenty-five of these killed are given as laborers, thirteen as officials and the remainder merchants, manufacturers and pensioners and two women.

JAP BAD MAN IS BAD NO MORE

SEATTLE, April 12.—K. Iwashita, who had a reputation as a gunman, was hit three times and killed here early today by M. Murakami, restaurant keeper, according to the police. A confession attributed to Murakami said that Iwashita had approached him on the street and demanded money on pain of death. Murakami told the police, they said, that he had grappled with Iwashita, wrestled his gun from him and started shooting to save his own life. A policeman who heard the shots, ran up and arrested Murakami as Iwashita crumpled on the pavement.

Iwashita had been suspected of slaying two men in this city within a year. The police said that he made a habit of going around to stores demanding money and threatening to kill those who refused it. Murakami declared he had received several of these visits from Iwashita and had refused to contribute.

Pleasure Yacht Burns
LONDON, April 12.—The luxurious yacht Wisdom II, owned by Edward Salisbury of Los Angeles has been badly damaged by fire at Savonia, Italy, according to a Central News dispatch from Genoa. Flames starting in the petrol tanks destroyed much of the machinery, art objects and gifts which royal personages had made to Mr. Salisbury. The damage is estimated at \$1,000,000.

WIND UNTEMPERED TO SPRING LAMBS

CHICAGO, April 12.—Unfavorable weather conditions during March retarded the growth of spring lambs in Tennessee and Kentucky to some extent, and the market movement in volume will probably be ten days or two weeks later than was indicated in the report of March 1, according to a statement today by the bureau of agricultural economics by the United States department of agriculture.

In Idaho the favorable weather conditions prevailing during February continued through March, with abundant sunshine and mild temperature and a good supply of feed. The number of early lambs dropped has been somewhat larger than last year and the number saved materially larger, and if conditions continue favorable, it is estimated that the number of early lambs for market will be around 20 per cent larger than last year.

Conditions in Texas have been excellent. Sheep will be fat by May, but the market supply will be below normal.
