COPCO MAY SELL ROSEBURG LIGHT

Paul B. McKee and J. C. Thompson of the Copco home office have returned to Medford after an extended business trip through the northern part of the state. At Roseburg and Portland Mr. McKee and Mr. Thompson negotiated with officials of the Douglas County Light and Power company which operates the Roseburg light and water plant. A 60-day investigation of the properties of the northern company will be carried on by the Copco organization after which the California Oregon Power company may operate the lines of the Douglas county company and serve the city of Roseburg and its vicinity with hydro-electric energy.

CREDIT ASSOCIATION REPRESENTATIVE HERE

Mr. R. L. Cochran, a special representative of the United Creditors association, is in the city to aid the members of the association and other local merchants in establishing credit business upon a sound basis.

"Credit is a necessity," said Mr. Cochran to The Mail-Tribune representative today. "Retail credit is the backbone of business. Over 60 per cent of the retail business is done on the charge account basis. If credit were destroyed the whole international structure of business would collapse over night."

"Business and banking authorities are agreed, however, that the expansion of credit has been so rapid that its momentum has carried it past the danger line until it threatens to destroy the very foundation upon which it rests—confidence."

Mr. Cochran explains that the purpose of the association which he represents is not to check or hamper the growth and expansion of credit business, but to make increased credit business practicable and profitable through providing the means of handling credit business upon a sound basis.

CANCELLATION OF THE LANSING-ISHII PACT IS DUE SOON

WASHINGTON, April 14.—(By the Associated Press)—An interchange of communications between the Washington and Tokio governments intended for publication in the form of an identical announcement that the Lansing-Ishii agreement of 1917 has been cancelled by mutual consent of the two nations, has been practically concluded. Indications are that the officials of the two governments will make pronouncement simultaneously in their respective capitals.

Cancellation of the Lansing-Ishii agreement restores a party of interests in China between the United States and Japan, according to terms of the nine power treaty and the Root-Takahira agreement. It also automatically nullifies all controversial clauses in agreements between the United States and Japan regarding China by eliminating for all time the provision contained in the Lansing-Ishii agreement by which America recognized that Japan had "special interests" in China.

Because of the political situation in Japan, recently enlivened by China's demand for abrogation of the "twenty-one demands treaty of 1915" Tokio statesmen have proceeded with unusual caution in arranging for the public announcement by them of cancellation.

It is understood that the emperor personally has been asked to sign the cancellation papers.

Now, however, the situation has progressed to the point where it will be possible for an official utterance to be made within a week. The state department has been prepared for more than a month to make its announcement and probably would have spoken long ago had it not been influenced by a desire to co-operate with the Japanese government.

Bank Reserve Increases

NEW YORK, April 14.—The actual condition of clearing house banks and trust companies for the week shows an excess in reserve of \$12,493,300. This is an increase of \$10,216,730.

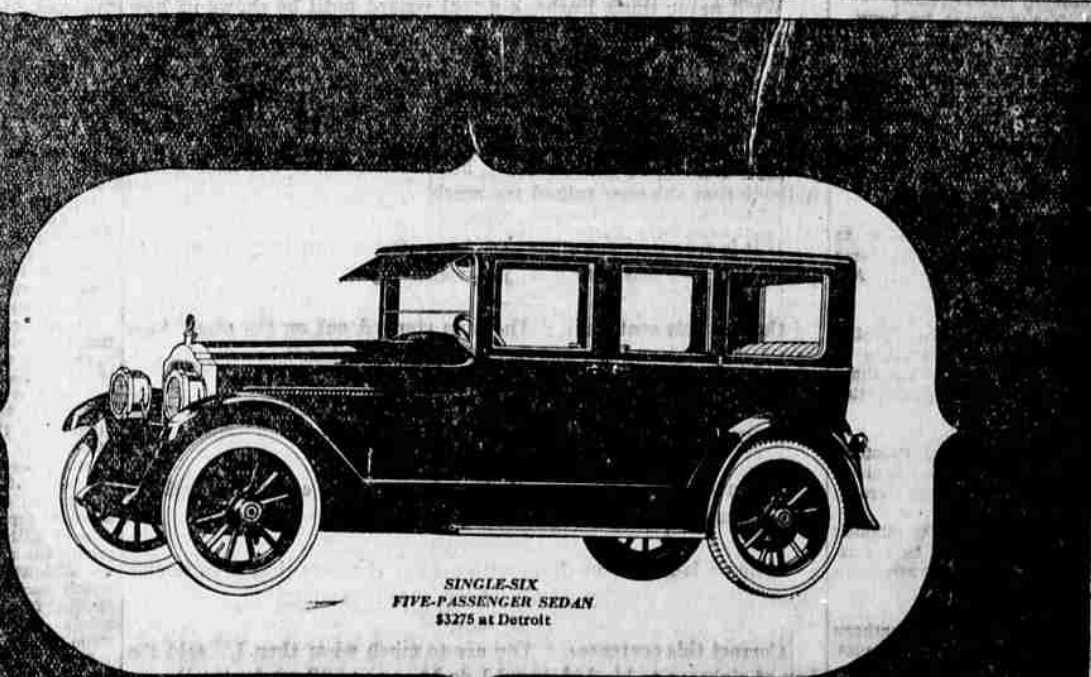
