Automobile registrations in Oregon totalled 112,700 on March 31 as compared to 93,360 for the same period last year, according to a summary compiled by Secretary of State Koser. Of the 112,700 registrations so far this year, 103,954 are passenger cars and 8746 are trucks. The increase of more than 19,399 in the total registrations for the first three months of this year over the same period in 1922 is unusually large as compared to the gains in registrations for previous years. Fees collected during the three month period aggregated \$3,099,588.25 as compared to \$2,505,411 in 1922. 11*
