

BUCHTER ACCUSES COLONEL BULL OF SLINGING MUD

M'NARY WOULD BOOST UP TIMBER REVENUE

WASHINGTON, April 17.—An attempt will be made in the next congress to increase to fifty per cent the share of states from the sale of government timber from reservations within their borders.

Chairman McNary of the senate reforestation commission in a letter today to W. B. Greeley, government chief forester, said the present allowance of 25 per cent was not enough, adding that because of the impairment of their taxing powers by the forest reserves, the states should receive at least one-half of the gross government receipts.

WASHINGTON, April 17.—A wholesale shakeup of the prohibition forces in Colorado, including suspension of five agents, was ordered today by Internal Revenue Commissioner Blair. Charges of selling liquor seized in prohibition raids was said at the commissioner's office to be involved in the case. The agents suspended were Daniel J. Gaffey, Charles J. Matter, Fred E. Klein, Dale B. Hunt and Ben-Englander. It was announced that George A. Crowder, legal adviser of the Denver office would be permitted to resign.

INSTRUCTION OF YOUTH BY CHURCH EPISCOPAL AIM

OMAHA, Neb., April 17.—A partial report of its committee on findings in which special emphasis was laid upon the importance of starting young people's movements in all gatherings of the Protestant Episcopal church was adopted by the churches fourth annual conference, in session here today.

The report, submitted by Dr. F. C. Grant, rector of Trinity Episcopal church, Chicago, contained a number of other findings, including a recommendation for establishment of teacher training classes, another urging that religious instruction in the churches be a subject properly set forth in the theological seminaries and a third asking that rural clergyman, if possible, take up summer school work.

Decision in favor of forming an association of accredited teachers in religious instruction for grading Sunday schools in the same manner as public schools was reached. There will be a spontaneous response to the conference's action Saturday in declaring for freedom of thought, in the opinion of Dr. William F. Gardner of New York, executive secretary of the church's department of religious action, who read a number of telegrams congratulating the conference on its stand.

No particular incident in the church's history such as the utterances of the Rev. Henry Stuckney Grant of New York City, were responsible for the conference's declaration, according to many delegates. Their stand for liberalism was taken, they say, because of many questions asked by young people who want to know whether it is necessary to give literal belief to the story of Jonah and the whale and other incidents recorded in the bible.

Discussing this subject, Canon Gamaliel Farrell of Newark, N. J., said the fundamentals of faith which rest in the bible and are expressed in the apostle's creed are set forth as necessary of belief.

J. Stanley Webster a Judge. WASHINGTON, April 17.—J. Stanley Webster of Spokane, a member of the last congress, has been selected to become federal judge, eastern district of Washington. Announcement of the selection was made today at the White House.

ENGLAND FAVORS CONCILIATION IN IRISH EMBROGLIO

LONDON, April 17.—The improved prospect for early peace in Ireland as a result of the utter discouragement of the republican movement through the recent government successes are leading many people throughout the country to question the wisdom of pressing for a fight to the finish, says a Dublin dispatch to the Times.

"The free state has some 12,000 or 15,000 prisoners in its jails," the correspondent writes, "and the question of their future is becoming acute. If the government insists upon an Carthaginian peace these men will come out of the prisons cowed for the moment but sullen and resentful at what they consider a peace of vengeance."

"More needs of bitterness will be sown and the spirit of revenge will be kept alive by the women. Thus the children will grow up as in the past with a spirit of hatred for the existing institutions bred in their bones."

There is a growing feeling that De Valera should, if possible, be given a chance to "save his face," as an indication of the prevalent feeling, the correspondent quotes the Irish Times as advocating a conference between a government representative and the republicans with a neutral chairman. It suggests Monsignor Luzzo, for the chairmanship.

The newspaper suggests that the idea may not be pleasing to the government, but says a conference is the only alternative to a continuation of the fighting until the extremists have been utterly crushed.
