

STEALS CAR FROM MEDFORDITE WHO BEFRIENDED HIM

S. R. Castile, proprietor of the Plumbing and Fixit Shop on South Holly is riding his bicycle again. He has had his Ford car stolen and the worst of it is that he just recently purchased it after much hard work and careful saving.

The car is a 1915 model with a delivery body, a steel tool box on the left side and the back of the seat cut so that it can be laid back for a bed. It is equipped with the old 1915 brass shelled radiator.

Two and a half months ago Marcus Waite, a nephew of Mr. Castile arrived from Washington and came to Castile who obtained work for him and befriended him. Last Thursday the boy took the car and two gasoline tanks, one of the Associated Oil company and another on the Shell company.

Waite took one look back to the Associated station and got cash for it and told the service station operator that he would stay here, for a while working on his car and would then leave for the north.

He also tried to cash the Shell check but did not succeed in doing so. It is believed by Mr. Castile that he is around town somewhere with the car working it over and making it into a bug so that it will not be recognized. The motor number of the car is 1119259 and anyone seeing the car or boy are asked to report it at once to the police as a warrant has been issued for his arrest.

Waite is about 6 feet, 2 inches tall, has light hair, blue eyes, fair complexion and weighs between 170 and 175 pounds. He is nineteen years old, wears loggers shoes with hobnails, a gray wool cap and waterproof trousers. His good clothes which he took with him in a chest in the rear of the car are wine-colored with a small check.

Soon after the car was taken last Thursday it was decided that the boy's name belied his character. The authorities got the idea that Marcus did not wait and issued a warrant for his arrest.

BOY INJURED IN AUTO COLLISION

Bernard Taylor, aged 12, suffered a broken collar bone, a dislocated shoulder and minor cuts and bruises this morning when the bicycle which he was riding collided with the Chevrolet touring car driven by Miss Mary Bebb at the corner of Main and Riverside.

Eye witnesses of the accident state that the boy was on the wrong side of Main street going east as Miss Bebb rounded the corner from North Riverside.

The boy was taken to the offices of Dr. R. W. Stearns where his collar bone was set and his shoulder put in place. Although he suffered considerable pain it is reported that he is now resting easily and is expected to recover in a short time. He was taken from the doctor's office to the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Rice, on East Main street.

SCHOOL TEACHERS 1924 SELECTED, RETAIN CAMPBELL

While the school board at its meeting elected last week elected the corps of teachers for the next school year with but few exceptions for various reasons, until the vacancies are all filled, the full list will not be given out for publication. However it can be stated that practically the present corps of instructors have been re-elected, and that the schedule of so-called increases were not given, although several teachers were granted increases where their salaries had been too low—mostly those whose present salaries are under \$1300.

It can also be stated that O. R. Campbell, principal of the high school for several years past, has been re-elected and given a salary for next year, \$2,800, an increase of \$100 over his present salary. It will be remembered that recently the school board re-elected Superintendent Aubrey Smith for another year.

Superintendent Smith and the school board have sent out contracts to all the teachers who have been re-elected and the signed contracts are expected to be returned within the next few weeks of all those who have accepted the re-elections.

NEW HEAD OF SALEM SCHOOL CUTS WAGES

SALEM, Ore., April 17.—Salaries of several employees of the state training school have been reduced by L. M. Gilbert, reinstated superintendent of the institution, who assumed control yesterday. The reductions were unanimously approved by the state board of control, it became known today.

Gilbert appointed Mrs. H. S. Presnall, wife of the farmer at the school, as matron to succeed Mrs. W. L. Kuser. She has been an employee of the institution for some years.

LOGANBERRY GROWERS FORM AN ASSOCIATION

PORTLAND, Ore., April 17.—Loganberry growers of Oregon, Washington and British Columbia have been summoned to a meeting here Thursday for the purpose of forming a co-operative association to market their product, according to announcement through the Portland chamber of commerce.

EX-GOVERNOR ENJOYING LIFE IN THE COUNTY JAIL

OXFORD, Miss., April 17.—Theodore G. Bilbo, former governor of Mississippi, awoke in the Lafayette county jail today facing 29 more days of imprisonment, the sentence of thirty days having been imposed after he had pleaded guilty to a charge of contempt of court.

Mr. Bilbo, who expected to be the star witness for Miss Francis Burkhead of New Orleans in her unsuccessful suit against Governor Lee M. Russell of Mississippi, failed to appear when summoned.

In his cozy quarters, vacated by the jailer and his family for the prisoner's use, Mr. Bilbo last night smoked his cigar, received his friends and wrote letters. The door was unlocked and the windows without bars. All evidences of physical restraint had been eliminated.

"The court's orders should be obeyed no matter who goes to jail," remarked the prisoner. "Let me express the hope that my fate will have a tendency to inspire a more wholesome respect for the authority of the courts. If it will, my few days are not altogether in vain."

When Mr. Bilbo appeared in federal court here today to answer to a charge of contempt because of his failure to appear as a witness in the suit of Miss Francis Burkhead against Governor Lee M. Russell last fall, he pleaded guilty. Judge Holmes fixed the sentence at a fine of \$100 and 30 days in jail.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., April 17.—At the hospital to which Wallace Dugid, Canadian wrestler, was taken last night, following his match with Ed (Strangler) Lewis, it was stated that his injuries were not serious.

DECLARES RULE U. S. MARINES IN HAITI BENEFICIAL

WASHINGTON, April 17.—The opinion that the future of Haiti never was brighter than at present is expressed by Brigadier General John H. Russell of the marine corps in a report to Secretary Hughes, submitted by him as the American high commissioner in Haiti. He has been serving in that capacity since March, 1922. In his report, made public today by the state department, General Russell declares that "it is believed that a continuance of the present policy of co-operation with the Haitian government, together with a maintenance of the sincere and earnest co-operation that has been given by it during the past eight months, can lead but to the development and progress of Haiti, the maintenance of peaceful conditions and the increased welfare and prosperity of the Haitian people."

General Russell comments on the activities of the marine corps occupation and makes this observation.

"During the period covered by this report, the efficiency of these forces has been maintained at a high standard."

Both the public health and public works departments, General Russell reports, have done excellent work despite a shortage of funds. Discussing the finances of the Haitian government he says steps have been taken to revise obsolete customs and internal tax laws.

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
