POOR POLITICAL STRATEGY.

THE NEW PRESIDENT of the New York Republican club would
read Senators Borah, Johnson and La Follette out of the G. O.
P. fold. The other day Senator Brookhart of Iowa was read out of
the party by the National Republican and similar action against Sen-
ator Frazier of North Dakota was advised.

What is the big idea? All of these Republican senators were
elected by large majorities in their respective states, all of them are
strong vote getters, and Borah and Johnson at least are regarded as
presidential timber.

Of course, there is considerable logic in such a demand, for if the
National Republican and the New York Republican club represent
Republican principles, then these five senators don't. But when did
logic become a factor in practical politics?

As a matter of fact there are no genuine political parties in this
country today. Both the Republican and Democratic divisions are
artificial ones. A Democrat like Senator Underwood for example,
has far more in common with a Republican like Senator Lodge, than
with Democrats like W. J. Bryan or Governor Al Smith. Brook-
hart, Frazier and La Follette don't speak the same political language
as Hoover, Hughes and Harding. Democratic leaders like Murphy
and Taggart, are complete political contradictions when Democratic
leaders like Woodrow Wilson and McAdoo are considered.

But such inconsistencies and contradictions have been recognized
in American political life for some time. One fails to understand
why Republican sensibilities should be so suddenly aroused, particu-
larly just before a Presidential campaign.

This country has two large political parties, in name, but no large
political parties in fact. The truth is there are two coalitions, one
riding an elephant and the other riding a donkey, one fighting under
the old Republican standard and one fighting under the old Demo-
cratic standard, but no genuine vital issues divide them.

This sudden demand for G. O. P. purity may signalize a new po-
litical alignment, but such an outcome has been anticipated so long
without being realized that one hesitates to make predictions now.
Unless the Republican stalwarts of the East however, want to lose
California, Idaho, Wisconsin, Iowa and North Dakota, they better
go slow on this expulsion business. It may be good political logic,
but it is "durned" poor political strategy.
