

FRUIT CANNING AND DRYING ARE FORUM TOPICS

Professor E. H. Weigand was the principal speaker at this noon's forum luncheon at the hotel Medford at which County Agent Claude C. Cate was chairman. A number of guests were present at the meeting.

The speaker gave an exhaustive discussion of the dried fruit industry and the possibility of its future successful development in the Rogue River valley. He advised that if local people were considering installing a dehydrating plant that they go slowly and not start on too large a scale as the market for dried products is limited.

He advised also that the college would be willing to co-operate in the fullest measure in assisting in the installation of the plant should one be started and would offer plans for recirculating dryer equal to the best. He warned against unscrupulous dryer salesmen selling dryers of no value for fabulous prices.

Prof. Weigand stated that the war injured the demand for dried products, for at that time so many inferior dried products were made and

sold to the government to be fed to the soldiers. The products in the majority were fit for nothing but hog feed, according to the speaker.

Prof. Weigand advised that a cold storage and canning plant of larger capacity than the dryer be operated in conjunction with the dryer and that a dryer unit of 8 tons capacity can be constructed for \$5000. The cannery and dryer will bring to the community the small farmer who develops a few acres intensively, says Mr. Weigand and will be an asset to any community.

The speaker delivered a very fluent talk full of information and was thanked by a number of appreciative listeners following the meeting for the information given. He has recently talked before the Ashland and Grants Pass chambers of commerce on the same subject.

TRAIN OF ALCOHOL CRASHES, 2 KILLED

NEW ORLEANS, April 18.—Engineer Hafen of MacComb was burned to death. Fireman Tom Rogers was fatally injured and a brakeman was hurt when a northbound freight train on the Illinois Central railroad crashed into the rear end of a standing freight train near Hammond, La., early today, igniting three cars of alcohol. Eleven freight cars and a mogul engine were destroyed.

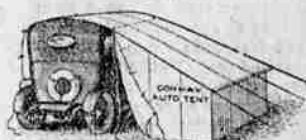
