

COPCO COMPANY GETS PERMIT TO BUILD WAREHOUSE

Among the building permits that have just been granted by the city council were ones for new warehouses, bungalows, garages and smaller structures, and repairs on buildings.

The largest proposed new structure for which a permit was given was for a big concrete warehouse with iron sides and roof, and to contain six rooms, including offices, which the California Oregon Power company is building on the east side of South Fir street between 13th and Stewart streets, at an estimated cost of \$29,000. The building, 198 feet by 40 feet, will be used as the general supply warehouse by the Rogue River, Slakiyou and Klamath divisions of the company, with offices for construction men.

A permit which the former contractor had neglected to obtain, was also issued to the state of Oregon for the building of the new armory at a cost of \$75,000. The structure is partially completed and the applicant for the permit was R. L. Stewart, the present contractor.

The application of W. J. Warner, postmaster, for permission to construct two poultry houses on the east side of South Oakdale between 11th and Dakota set the councilmen guessing, as one of the structures is on a large scale. They feared that the poultry houses would be too close to dwellings for comfort, and it was decided to refer the applications to the city planning commission. The large building will be a one-story affair 100 by 16 feet, whose estimated cost is \$590. The smaller one-story structure planned is 18 by 22 feet; estimated cost \$250.

A permit was also granted to Walter D. Merrick for alterations in the interior of the Natatorium and for new structures on the grounds, incident to the establishment of the enlarged Nat auto camp ground, at an estimated cost of \$10,000.

Other building permits issued by the council were as follows:

George W. Neilson, for a bungalow on the north side of West 4th between Oakdale and North Peach street, cost \$2,000.

Fort G. Hubbard, for frame building on South Riverside, between 9th and 12th streets, cost \$400.

T. J. Gifford for improvements on frame bungalow at 103 Crater Lake avenue, cost \$200.

V. E. Conser, for garage at 121 Genesee, cost \$100.

J. W. Jacobs, for frame warehouse at No. 401 North Riverside, cost \$200.

R. E. Childreth, for woodshed on north side of East 9th, between Cottage and the end of the street, cost \$100.

R. I. Stewart for garage 16 by 18 feet west side of Apple street, at 217, between 4th and 5th streets.

Wool Sells 40 Cents Lb.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., April 18.—According to announcement here today by the R. A. Jackson estate of Columbia county has sold its spring wool clip, 65,000 pounds to a Portland concern at forty cents per pound. Other smaller wool deals are now being closed in this territory, it was said.

R. R. Wages Increased.
CHICAGO, April 18.—(By the Associated Press)—The Illinois Central railroad has advanced the wages of its mechanics two cents an hour, it became known today.

RECORD WAGES FOR SALMON FISHERMEN

SAN FRANCISCO, April 18.—Reconsideration by the fishermen's union of the wage scale to be paid by the Alaska packer's association for salmon fishermen at Bristol Bay was ordered today by the union. Yesterday the union rejected the scale.

The company announced it had made its final proposition to the men.

ASTORIA, Ore., April 18.—A spirited meeting is expected Saturday when directors of the Columbia River Fishermen's league, representing the majority of the salmon fishermen of the Columbia river, meet with packers to fix the price of salmon for the coming season.

The league directors have served notice that they will ask 16 cents a pound for prime chinook salmon, with the prices for other varieties in proportion.

While packers have declined to comment on this figure, a number of cannerymen have admitted that the price this year probably will be the highest in the history of the industry.

GOMPERS DEFEATS AID TO DE VALERA

NEW YORK, April 18.—Efforts of James Larkin, Irish agitator, and the Ulster defense alliance to obtain a loan from the American fund for public service, inc., commonly known as the Garland fund, for the purpose of sending a relief ship to Ireland, has been unsuccessful.

In revealing this today, the executive committee of the alliance denounced the officers of the fund as anti-Irish, anti-labor and unworthy of the confidence reposed in them by Charles Garland, donor of the \$800,000 on which the foundation is based.

The fund recently was denounced by Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, as un-American and an aid to revolutionaries.

CHICAGO TRIBUNE WINE LABEL CASE SUPREME COURT

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., April 18.—(By the Associated Press)—Affirming the decision of Circuit Judge Harry Fisher of Cook county, the supreme court today ruled that the city of Chicago can not maintain its libel suit against the Chicago Tribune. The case was the first on record in which a municipality had attempted a libel suit. The newspaper was charged with having damaged the credit of the city through editorial criticism of its corporate acts.

"The opinion of this court is based," the supreme court decision said, "in the fundamental principle of the American government, that every citizen has a right to criticize the government and its administration so long as they do not advocate overthrow of the existing government or violation of law."

"Liberty of the press," the decision continued, "is the same thing as freedom of speech."

GERMAN MARKS IN SUDDEN COLLAPSE

NEW YORK, April 18.—German marks, which had been pegged by the German government at .0048 cents for two months, despite a tremendous increase in note circulation, broke to .0023 cent in today's early trading, one of the most violent reactions in recent months. Local exchange dealers were unable to explain the sudden drop, but said that it probably indicated the withdrawal of general support.

Overnight Berlin dispatches, however, reported that the reichsbank had shipped an additional 125,000,000 gold marks to the Bank of England, making a total of 300,000,000 gold marks deposited there in connection with the government policy to peg the mark during the Ruhr struggle.
