

Notice of Sale of Government Timber

General Land Office, Washington, D. C., March 30, 1923.

Notice is hereby given that subject to the conditions and limitations of the acts of June 9, 1916 (39 Stat. 218), February 28, 1919 (40 Stat. 1179), and June 4, 1920 (41 Stat. 758), and Departmental regulations of September 15, 1917 (46 L. D. 447), and June 22, 1920 (47 L. D. 411), the timber on the following lands will be sold May 11, 1923, at 10 o'clock a. m., at public auction at the United States land office at Roseburg, Oregon, to the highest bidder at not less than the appraised value as shown by this notice, sale to be subject to the approval of the Secretary of the Interior. The purchase price, with an additional sum of one-fifth of one per cent, thereof, being commissions allowed, must be deposited at time of sale, money to be returned if sale is not approved, otherwise patent will issue for the timber which must be removed within ten years. Bids will be received from citizens of the United States, associations of such citizens and corporations organized under the laws of the United States or any State, Territory or District thereof only. Upon application of a qualified purchaser, the timber on any legal subdivision will be offered separately before being included in any offer of a larger unit.

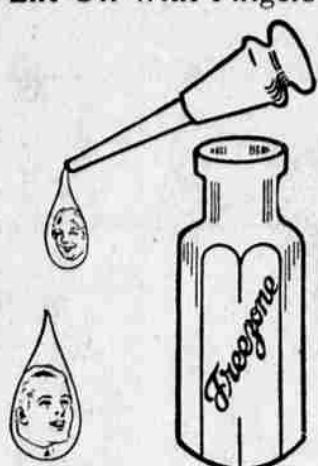

WILLIE KAMM AND JIMMY O'CONNELL GET GOOD START

CHICAGO, April 19.—(By Associated Press.) The 1923 major league baseball season, two days old in the National league and just half of that in the American, finds fans watching to see how long some of the clubs will keep their 1000 percentage in "how they stand." Each team having played only one game in the American, four of the teams are spotless this morning—New York, Detroit, Philadelphia and Cleveland. Only two in the National league, New York and Brooklyn, are unmarred, the Giants standing out alone as first, as they won their two games and the Robins only one. The first game having been a tie. Of the opening games the one that dedicated the new Yankee stadium was the most conspicuous, not because of the quality of the game but because 74,200 persons were there and Babe Ruth knocked a home run. The Yankees won easily over the Boston Red Sox 4 to 1, three runs being scored on Ruth's homer.

Though in hot water several times, Long John Scott, the world's series hero of the Giants, pitched the Giants to a 7 to 4 victory over the Boston Braves and made a home run. He was replaced by Jess Barnes in the 7th.

Brooklyn gained its first victory of the season over Philadelphia 6 to 5, the Robins coming to life for five runs in the ninth after the Quakers had the game on ice. After winning their opening day games, Pittsburgh and Cincinnati, picked by the experts as the Giants' most formidable rivals, both lost yesterday, the Pirates to Chicago 7 to 2, and the Reds to St. Louis, another early favorite, 4 to 2.

Cobb in Old Form

Ty Cobb's Detroit Tigers got off to an even start with the Yanks, defeating the St. Louis Browns, 9 to 6. Cobb, who has been reported slipping each year for the last half dozen, made three hits out of four times at bat and scored three runs.

Philadelphia and Cleveland won the other two openers, the Athletics from the Washington Senators 3 to 1, with Walter Johnson the losing pitcher, and the Indians from the Chicago White Sox, 6 to 5.

Johnny Keller of the Chicago Nationals had the honor of being the first player to pole a home run in the new Cubs' park. Charles Grimm slashed one right after him, being the first visitor to pole a four bass in the new park. Scott of the Giants, Mann of St. Louis, Sand of the Phillies and Wheat of Brooklyn also made homers.

Jimmy O'Connell, the \$75,000 star obtained by the Giants from the San Francisco club poled a triple and scored one run for his club in three times at bat. He had one chance in the outfield and took care of that easily.

Willie Kamm, the \$100,000 beauty who was purchased by the White Sox from San Francisco, made his major debut against Tris Speaker's tribe, handling his only two chances cleanly and knocking out a double in four times at bat.

GREATEST BASEBALL CROWD IN HISTORY

NEW YORK, April 19.—(By Associated Press.) More baseball hungry humans sat in the Yank stadium in the Bronx yesterday and saw Babe Ruth and Bob Shawkey win a ball game than attended the other season openings in the three American league cities of Philadelphia, Cleveland and St. Louis combined. The Yankee total officially was 74,217, the biggest baseball crowd of all time.

National: Brooklyn 12,000; Boston 20,000; Chicago 33,000; Cincinnati 30,000. Total 95,000.

American: New York 74,000; St. Louis 20,000; Philadelphia 20,000; Cleveland 20,000. Total 134,000.

MASKED DANCER DANCES 88 HRS., BREAKS RECORD

CLEVELAND, April 19.—A new world's record for continuous dancing, 88 hours and 18 minutes, was set here this morning by Arthur Howard Klein, when he quit dancing at 6:18 a. m., at a Cleveland Heights dancing academy. Klein, wearing a mask, started dancing at 2 p. m. Sunday.

Dancing at another hall, Miss Mildred Duval, 20, a stenographer, was still going at 7:46 a. m., at which time she had passed the record of 77 hours and 45 minutes set by Miss Rose Smith at the same hall. Miss Smith quit at 7:05 a. m., because her feet hurt her. Miss Smith, before quitting had broken the record of 75 hours and 10 minutes, set by Miss Margaret Gerrick here last night.

Klein, the present holder of the record, is 26 years old and a trained athlete. He set out to capture the championship by systematic dieting and exercise as a means of supporting his wife and baby, according to friends.

Cleveland Heights authorities refused to allow the public to witness Klein's performance, limiting the attendance to dancing partners and judges.

Priscilla Dean, Rialto

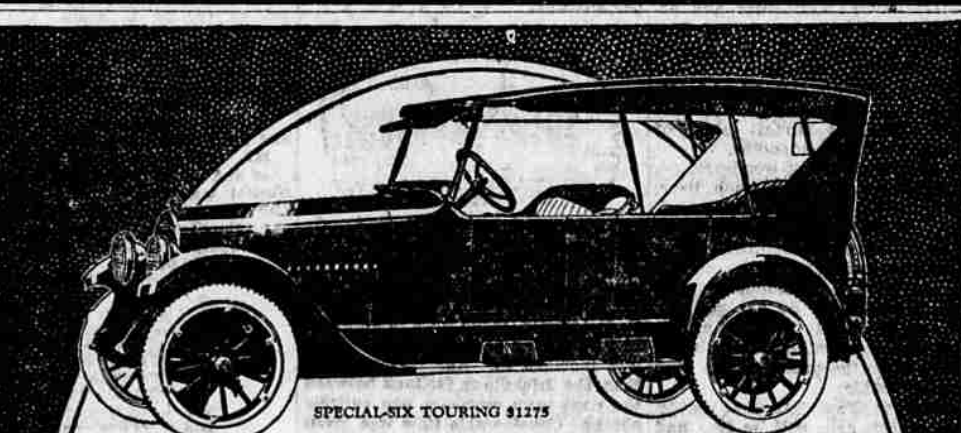
