BABE RUTH STILL GOING STRONG, 2 HITS, TWO PASSES

CHICAGO, April 20.—(By Associated Press.) With the strain of the opening games over for the season, teams of the National and American leagues got down to business today and started on their annual five months' grind.

The Giants got a brace of victories from Christy Mathewson's Boston Braves yesterday and retained their hold on first place in the Nationals with four wins and no defeats.

In the American league, winners of the opening games repeated. The Yankees made it two straight from Boston. Babe Ruth hit a triple to start an inning that netted seven runs. Ruth also got a single and drew two passes, bringing his batting average up to .600 for two days.

Cleveland the White Sox went eleven innings before the Indians finally gathered in the Chicago scalp.

Ty Cobb's Detroit Tigers batted their way to victory over the St. Louis Browns. The Chicago Cubs and the Pittsburgh Pirates put on a slugging bee in the Nationals, the Cubs winning in a game featured by four home runs.

Brooklyn tried bravely to stage a ninth inning rally against Philadelphia and succeeded in putting over two runs, but not enough to win. The Cardinals and Cincinnati put on a heavy swinging contest, finally won by St. Louis.

Johnny Kelly of the Cubs and Jimmy Dicks of the Athletics cracked out homers again yesterday, making a brace for each in as many days.

Willie Kamm, the Coast league star with the White Sox, fared better than Jimmy O'Connell, his old teammate, now with the Giants. Willie scored one run, drove out two hits and sent one runner home. He also accepted four chances without a slip. Jimmy bagged one hit, captured one fly and stole a base.

Rogers Hornsby cracked out three hits in four times at bat, and two of them were triples.

APPLE GROWERS OF OREGON ORGANIZE

PORTLAND, Ore., April 20.—Organization of a co-operative sales association to handle the apple crop of the Pacific northwest was arranged for at a meeting here today of representatives of various districts. E. E. Paville, chairman of the agricultural committee of the Portland chamber of commerce was authorized to appoint a committee to formulate definite plans for the organization for consideration at a future meeting.

According to plans outlined the association would not only market the apple crops but would establish a brand and advertise extensively.

GOVERNOR AL SMITH ACCEPTS INVITATION

OLYMPIA, April 20.—Governor Albert Smith of New York has telegraphed to Governor Hart that he would be glad to join in a call for a conference of state executives to strengthen public sentiment for a constitutional amendment under which minimum wage laws could be sustained. He suggested that the time and place be made to suit the convenience of other conferees.

Governor Smith is the fourth governor to accept an invitation of Governor Hart to join in calling a minimum wage conference. The fifth invitation was sent to Friend W. Richardson, California, who asked for a delay.

MUNICH, April 20.—(By the Associated Press.)—Adolph Hitler, the Bavarian fascist leader, has been summoned to appear before the Leipzig supreme court. It was announced today, on the charge of inciting his supporters to oppose republican institutions.

DUESSELDORF.—The French announced the discovery at Heine of the headquarters of an organization of sabotage in the Ruhr to prevent the occupying forces from getting out coal and coke.

PRESIDENT'S TRIP TO COAST TO START SATURDAY, JUNE 16

WASHINGTON, April 20.—The preparation of a list of places where President Harding will speak on his prospective western trip this summer has progressed to a point where a dozen cities in the central and western states have been more or less definitely determined upon for the delivery of important addresses. Although no detailed dates have been worked out, it has been established definitely that the westward trip will begin about mid-June, probably on Saturday, June 16.

St. Louis and Kansas City, included in the list, are expected to be selected as the cities in which the president will sound the keynote of his message to the west in a review of the accomplishments of his administration. The president is understood to have definitely decided against a number of invitations urging that he make the first speech of his trip in Ohio, Indiana, Kentucky or Illinois, preferring to make contact at once with the country west of the Mississippi.

The other cities upon which more or less definite decision has been reached and the order in which the president expects to visit them are Denver, Salt Lake City, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Seattle, Portland, Helena, Minneapolis, Chicago and Detroit.

Although some of his advisers are urging that President Harding confine himself to important addresses at these points, the list of cities may be increased to perhaps 20, Mr. Harding having originally planned to make about that many speeches. He was said still to feel that he might do so without overtaxing his strength, although his plan to visit Alaska during the summer may possibly make this plan inadvisable.

Indians Are Also Dancing
ROOSEVELT, Wash., April 20.—Crowds from the surrounding country witnessed the tribal dance here yesterday of Indian tribes gathered from the Rock Creek canyon for their annual dance and feast.

The dance started Sunday with the "church dance."

U. S. MAIL AVIATORS FLY TWO MILLION MILES EVERY YEAR

WASHINGTON, April 20.—Up to the close of last year aviators of the mail service had flown a total of 5,281,323 miles since the inauguration of service in May 1918, according to a report on the accomplishments of the service made public today by the post office department. It was estimated that the service now is operating on a schedule of two million miles a year. Figures on the operating efficiency gave the percentage performance for the entire five year period as 90.39 per cent which the report stated as a "relatively high figure." The total cost of the service since its inauguration was figured at \$4,295,967.89, much of the expenditure having been made for permanent improvements such as repair shops and development of landing fields.

A total of 160,347,600 letters had been delivered by air, the total of last year increasing to 60,000,000.

The report showed that on more than one-third of the 14,704 trips made the pilots had to wing their way thru rain, snow, hail or fog. The increasing dependability of the service was said to have been shown in the decrease in the number of forced landings from 1,473 in 1921 to 573 last year. The decrease was attributed to increased skill of pilots and rigid inspection of planes.

RECEIVE BIDS FOR HIGHWAY BRIDGES

PORTLAND, Ore., April 17.—Bids on road work in four counties aggregating approximately \$81,000, and on four bridges in as many counties, amounting to \$219,580, were opened today by the state highway commission. H. B. Vanduser of Portland, new member of the commission, sat with the body today for the first time.

ANNOUNCE U. S. N. CHANGES AT SEA

ON BOARD FLAGSHIP CALIFORNIA, April 17.—(By Wireless to the Associated Press.)—Secretary Denby today announced the following changes to be made in the fleet:

Admiral Hilary P. Jones will be relieved as commander in chief of the United States fleet by Admiral R. E. Coontz, August 5, 1923 at San Diego, Cal.

Admiral E. W. Eberle will become chief of naval operations relieving Admiral Coontz about July 31. Previous to this date Admiral S. S. Robinson will relieve Admiral Eberle as commander in chief of the battle fleet. This change will probably take place at San Francisco as the ships will be there at the time.
